In the agreement, the city is obli-gated to provide 24-hour emergency coverage for the county with man-power and a rescue vehicle whenever asked by dispatch. The city will pay all the costs of the vehicle and per-sonnel and will provide the county a yearly report of operations and ex-penses of the rescue unit. In return, the county will pay the city \$10.000 each year on or before

city \$10,000 each year on or before July 1 for the service. It will pay \$20,000 in back billing for the years \$20,000 in back billing for the years 2009 and 2010 and agrees to budget \$10,000 for 2013 to be paid in 2014 along with that year's payment. The city is using a 2008 Ford Mini Rescue Pumper. The commissioners signed the con-tract and returned it to Mrs. Griffiths so that the Norton City mayor and city clerk could sign it

the budget turned in to Norton County

the budget turned in to Norton County commissioners on Monday by Solid Waste Supervisor John Miller. Mr. Miller said that many things in the 2013 budget including salaries were misfigured and that he has looked back to see what the landfill will need in the future. His budget for 2014 is asking for \$70,000 less than this year. The 2013 budget for the landfill and recycling center is \$299,135. The 2014 budget is for \$229,000.
