cynthia.haynes@nwkansas.com While most if not all of the sheriff's officers have received cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training, they are not necessarily certified now.

Sheriff Troy Thomson visited with the Norton County commissioners on Monday after Commissioner R.A. Peterson asked if the sheriff's people were certified in the life-saving technique, since they were commonly first on the scene of an accident.

The sheriff said that back when Dr. Roy Hartley was the county health officer he didn't want law enforcement to care for the injured feeling that their primary duty was traffic and crowd control.

Back then, he said, there was a movement to have fewer emergency medical personel and just have the sheriff's officers take over some of those duties.

The doctor, however, didn't think that was a good idea at all so he said that the officers should not provide emergency care but should do what they were trained to do.

He felt, Sheriff Thomson said, that

enough to do and that their primary job the County Health Nurse Gina Frack is was to keep the scene safe for other to provide care.

Sheriff Thomson said that he and, he thought, all of his officers have taken cardiopulmonary resuscitation but that they have not kept up their certification. However, he said, in a dire emergency, he felt that they could handle doing CPR.

It would not be helpful, he noted, to just get some of the officers certified.

"If you're going to certify one, you need to certify all," he said because you never know who will be handling an emergency.

The sheriff, who is the acting county emergency preparedness officer since the regular officer Justina Smith is the acting office manager for the road and bridge department, said that he is starting to get quite a few e-mails on emergency preparedness but doesn't have any of the information or files to deal with them.

The files, he said, are at the county shop, where Ms. Smith had her office as emergency preparedness officer. He asked if it would be OK to get the files and bring them to his office because

Man dies in roll over accident

The Kansas Highway Patrol responded to a fatal car accident early Wednesday morning, west of Densmore.

Ernest Leroy Kilpatrick, 64, of Collyer, Kansas was eastbound on Highway K9 in his 1999 Chevrolet Suburban when at mile marker 36 his vehicle stuck a single deer. Kilpatrick swerved and over corrected, causing his vehicle to enter the north ditch and roll. The driver was ejected and the vehicle came to rest on its wheels facing south.

Mr. Kilpatrick was taken to the Norton County Hospital where he was pronounced dead and his next of kin was notified.
