Norton athlete to play in Shrine Bowl

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Jacob Brooks, a 6'3", 190 pound 2013 graduate of Norton Community High School, will be a member of the West team in the 40th annual Kansas Shrine Bowl All-Star Football Game, which will be played this Saturday, July 27 at Yager Stadium on the Washburn University campus in Topeka.

Kickoff will be at 7 p.m. but several other events will precede the game.

Shrine Bowl Parade

The annual Shrine Bowl Parade, the largest Shrine Parade in Kansas, will begin at 10 a.m. on Saturday. It will run some 13 blocks in downtown Topeka and will feature Shrine parade units from across Kansas, the players and coaches and the All-State Masonic Band, comprised of up to 200 of the state's best high school musicians. The band will also perform during pre-game and at halftime of the Shrine Bowl game.

Combine

The pro-style high school combine will be conducted on Saturday at Yager Stadium. It is an opportunity for high school football players to have their skills evaluated in a pro-style environment.

Featured at the combine will be Mark Simoneau, former Smith Center, Kansas State and NFL star player. His company, Simoneau Sports Performance, based in Overland Park, will conduct the combine, which will be sponsored by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

"We'll put the athletes through a battery of tests," said

Simoneau. "The tests will include 40-yard dash, broad jump and vertical jump. It gives us a baseline to compare different athletes and their abilities athletically."

The data will go out to college coaches around the state.

It will include trophies in each bike class with awards to be presented at halftime. The event is open to anyone. Details are on the Shrine web site.

All-Star Cross Country Run

For the sixth straight year, 60 of the best Kansas cross-country runners will compete for medals and perform part of their race before the large crowd and a state-wide television audience.

It will feature 15 women and 15 men from the East and 15 women and 15 men from the West. The runners were selected based on race records and coaches' recommendations. They'll run a course around and through the Washburn University campus in Topeka just prior to the game. The plan is to finish the race as part of the televised pre-game show.

Members of the public are also invited to run the two-mile course. Their race will be timed separately from the regular runners and medals will be awarded for both men and women runners in several age categories. Registration can be made by calling the Shrine Bowl office at 785-530-5524. The race will start south of the Student Recreation and Wellness Center. Game day registration starts at 6 p.m. at the course starting line.

Jacob Brooks is one of the top football players in the state of Kansas.

He was a four-year letterman for coach Lucas Melvin's Blue Jay grid squad. He was a running back, wide receiver, defensive back, punter and kick returner. He was a first team All-Mid-Continent League choice by vote of league coaches and was also chosen to the Class 3A All-State Team selected by the Kansas Football Coaches Asso-

He was also named to the All-Area Super 11 by the Hays Daily News.

As the Norton tailback, Jacob gained 1,162 yards and scored 11 rushing touchdowns this past season. He averaged 6.2 yards per carry and also caught 10 passes for 306 years and four touchdowns.

He was also a four-year letterman in basketball where he was a first team All-Mid-Continent League choice and was the leading scorer for the team. A four-year letterman in track,

Jacob was a sprinter and high jumper and a consistent finisher in the State Track Meet.

He was the high point performer for the third year in a row for the Norton track and field team.

In the past, he has been a solid member of the Norton American Legion baseball team.

Jacob will continue his football career this fall when he plays for Hutchinson Community College.
