Tag renewals due by next Wednesday

July 31 is the last day to purchase "J", "K", or "L" tags at the Norton County Treasurers office. Bring current proof of insurance for all vehicles. You can now get your Kansas Parks Passports when renewing your tags for \$15.50 per vehicle. For trailers, include current insurance for the vehicle that will pull the trailer. Office staff will verify VIN number, policy number and current expiration date. Office hours are Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Drivers license renewals can be done Tuesdays through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. You need to have your drivers license and a current utility bill or current bank statement with your name and address for proof of residency. CDL renewals must be done at Phillipsburg, Hays or Colby.

School board budget discussed

Superintendent Greg Mann presented the proposed 2013-14 budget to the Board of Education, U.S.D. 211, at its regular meeting on Monday at the Alice Tweed Center. The Board approved the budget for publication with an increase in the capital outlay mill levy to five mills and an increase in the Local Option Budget to 21.4 mills. The budget was approved by a 5-1 vote, with Bill Jones voting no. Steve Berry requested that the minutes reflect that the increases are necessary due to the fact that the Kansas State Legislature is not appropriating enough funds to pay for all state aid owed to schools according to state statutes. The Board will hold a budget hearing on Aug. 19, at 7:30 p.m.

in the U.S.D. 211 board room.

The Board also appointed a new president and vice president for the 2013-14 school year. Chris Harting was appointed president by a vote of 5-1 (Harting abstained) and Robert Wyatt was unanimously chosen as vice president.

The Board accepted the resignation of Gregg Ankenman, who has decided to retire after 27-plus years as Assistant Maintenance Director effective as of July 15. The Board thanked Ankenman for his service to U.S.D. 211.

Norton Community High School has a new assistant football coach for the upcoming season. The Board unanimously approved Terrell Land to the position.

The Board made the following ap-

pointments:

-appointed April Karnopp as the board representative to the NCKSEC Board of Directors.

-appointed Craig Renner as the board representative on the Professional Development Council for the 2013-14 school year.

-appointed Robert Wyatt as the board representative to the Curriculum Coordinating Council.

-appointed Chris Harting as the board representative on the KASB Governmental Relations Board.

In other board news: -Superintendent Mann reported the school calendars have arrived and enrollment cards were mailed on Monday.

-Mann also reported that no one has

contacted him with regards to the open board position and he will continue to advertise the position.

-approved the Classified Employee handbook, Eisenhower Elementary School faculty handbook and the junior/high school faculty handbook as presented.

-approved the proposed Board of Education policy additions and changes as presented.

-accepted the proposal from K & K Insurance, Topeka, for student accident insurance for a cost of \$11,460 for 2013-14, by a 4-2 vote. Craig Renner and Bill Jones voted no.

-approved participation in the Decatur County Neighborhood Revitaliza-

Temperatures hit three-digits that day, but the newly installed air conditioning unit kept the all-purpose room comfortable while about 50 people modeled their dance attire, ate popcorn and generally had a good time.

Norcatgur City Clerk Deb Marshall said, "The roof is almost done. It looks so nice and it will be wonderful to no longer have any leaks."

Traveling on trust, learning about small town America

On June 20th of this year, a twenty two year old man and college graduate from Calvin College of Grand Rapids, Michigan left Mt. Vernon, Washington on an adventure of a lifetime.

Josh DeLacy is from Port Orchard Washington and after he graduated from college he didn't feel like he wanted to jump right into the workforce but rather he chose to get some life lessons on the road from the people of rural America. Traveling on foot hitchhiking only the smaller highways he plans to reach Sante Fe, New Mexico by July 28 for a writing class and then hopes to be back home in Washington by August 17 to attend a wedding.

Josh has been on other hiking trips

before so he started planning this one six months ago. He said that his parents were not surprised at all that he would do something like this but didn't expect it to be so extreme.

He carries a 55 pound backpack with a bible, some books, a tent, sleeping bag, a pad, three changes of clothes, some water, a small amount of food and a small cook stove, which he has yet to use after twenty days on the road. He also has his iPad and a cell phone but carries no money or weapons. Knowing that he needs to be visible he also totes along his hunter orange Winchester ball cap. He is solely dependent on the kindness of strangers for food, rides, showers and a place to sleep from time to time.
