DUI crackdown campaign set

The Kansas Highway Patrol will be joining other local law enforcement agencies from across Kansas to work extra hours during the You Drink. You Drive. You Lose. Special Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP). The STEP campaign runs from August 15, through the Labor Day weekend, until September 2. The additional enforcement efforts are underwritten by a grant from the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT). During STEP, there will be additional enforcement of all Kansas traffic laws, with particular focus on impaired driving laws.

If you are involved in a crash in which alcohol is a contributing factor, according to KDOT, you are two-and-one-half times more likely to be injured and four-and-one-half times more likely to be seriously injured or killed, than if you were in a

crash in which alcohol was not a factor. The ratio of death to injury in alcohol-related crashes is almost four times higher than the death to injury ratio for nonalcohol related crashes.

"The last thing we want to investigate on our highways is a fatality crash involving someone's family member. We hope that everyone will remember to designate a sober driver, not just this weekend, but all of the time," Colonel Ernest E. Garcia. superintendent of the Kansas Highway Patrol, said.

"Troopers and other officers will be out in force over the next few weeks, and we hope this contributes to a safer time for all of those utilizing our Kansas

Over the 2012 Labor Day holiday reporting period for the Patrol (KHP stats only), troopers worked four fatal crashes on Kansas' highways, resulting in four deaths. One of the fatal crashes was alcohol-related. There were four total impaired driving crashes worked by KHP. The Patrol arrested 39 people for impaired driving. Personnel also assisted 1,193 motorists who needed help on Kansas roads. The reporting period for the Labor Day 2012 weekend ran during a portion of the STEP period, and ran from 6:00 p.m. the Friday prior to the holiday, through midnight the Monday of the holiday.

The men and women of the Kansas Highway Patrol hope that everyone has a safe Labor Day holiday weekend. If you need assistance on a Kansas highway, or if you suspect an impaired driver, the Patrol asks that you call *47 (*HP) for KHP dispatch, or *582 (*KTA) if you are on the Turnpike.

Fire training to focus on grain storage

Grain-related entrapment, engulfments, asphyxiations and entanglements are safety concerns for those who work on farms and in commercial grain facilities.

A first responder course for fire and rescue instructors on incidents involving grain storage, processing and handling facilities will be held on the Kansas State University campus on Aug. 21. The Department of Grain Science and Industry is hosting the session at the International Grains Program building. The workshop is limited to individuals who are currently emergency first responders or fire-rescue instructors.

Warnings and advisories for Kansas lakes

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) samples publicly accessible bodies of water for cyanobacteria, commonly called blue-green algae, when the agency is alerted to a potential algae bloom in Kansas lakes. When harmful algal blooms are present, KDHE, in cooperation with the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism (KD-WPT) and other lake managers where appropriate, responds by informing the public of these conditions.

Based upon sampling results and established health risk levels, the following Warnings and Advisories are in place.

KDWPT reminds visitors that when a lake is under an Advisory or Warning, marinas, lakeside businesses, and park camping facilities remain open for business, although swim beaches will be closed. Park drinking water and showers are safe and not affected by the algae bloom. Also, it is safe to eat fish caught during a harmful blue-green algae outbreak, as long as consumers clean and rinse the fish with clean, potable water; consume only the fillet portion; and discard all other parts. People should also wash their hands with clean, potable water after handling fish taken from an affected lake.

As a result of this week's water sampling, the health advisory has been lifted at Harvey County East Lake and Harvey County West Lake.
