Sheriff's department facing multiple issues

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 Norton Sheriff Troy Thomson isn't having a very good August but he's getting his problems worked out.

On Monday, Sheriff Thomson told the Norton County commissioners that he has had an attempted suicide in the jail, has had a deputy resign and has found out that he needs a new video security system for the jail.

The sheriff said that Deputy Scott Bohl has resigned but that part-time dispatcher Scott Kleinschmidt is taking law enforcement training on his own

time and money and plans to work part-time as a deputy when he is done so that no one new will be hired for the vacant position.

On Aug. 6, the sheriff said, one of the jail inmates tried to hang himself. However, another inmate saw what was going on and called for help so the suicide attempt was unsuccessful.

When the jail staff tried to download the security camera that should have been recording the whole thing, the system refused to co-operate and it looks like it is shot. The camera have been having some lens problems for

a while he said as sunlight has burned them over the past 10 years the system has been in place.

Sheriff Thomson said that he called Kevin Hansen with CEI Security and Sound out of Hastings, Neb., the technician for the system and he came down and got at least one camera up and running. However, the sheriff said the system is outdated and it looks like the programming is blown.

Mr. Hansen has given the county a bid of a little over \$24,000 to replace the system with a new digital one, the sheriff said, and he would like to take

that bid since no one in Norton County does anything like this, it would be difficult to get more bids and time is of the essence.

"I didn't plan on using my capital outlay for this," the sheriff said, but added that he doesn't feel that he has any choice but to replace the mostly dead system as quickly as possible.

He noted that the system put in 10 year ago cost the county \$22,000 so with inflation, the \$24,000 plus price tag isn't that bad.

Participants wanted for Leadership Challenge

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The Norton City/County Economic Development group is looking for five to seven people to take the 2103 Northwest Kansas Regional Leadership Challenge, a series of four day-long classes.

Those who've completed the Leadership Norton County classes would be good candidate because this would increase their ability to help the community, said Economic

Development Director Scott Sproul and the group's monthly meeting on Tuesday.

The classes are being sponsored by Rural Telephone/NexTech, Midwest Energy and PrairieLand Electric, Mr. Sproul said. The energy companies will pay for the speakers, venue and meals for people from Norton, Russell, Smith and Phillips counties and possibly Osborne County, he said. The communities should pick up the cost of transportation for their attendees so

there should be no out-of-pocket costs for them.

Attendees should plan to go to all four classes, Mr. Sproul said. Classes will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 10, in Russell, Tuesday, Oct. 8, in Norton; Wednesday, Nov. 20, in Smith Center; and Tuesday, Dec. 10, in Phillipsburg.

The classes will cover a wide range of subjects to help the participants diagnose and help solve community problems.

Information about the classes will be posted on the economic development web site, www.discovernorton.com.

Mr. Sproul said that he has talked to

a couple of people who are interested in purchasing the building, between Moffet Drug and Renew Chic Boutique that the group is using as a business incubator.

"I'm happy to say the business incubator is doing very well," he told the group and added that he definitely wants to continue having such a space available although the present occupant is growing enough that they will probably have to move to a larger space.
