mstephens@nwkansas.com The Norton City/Economic Development board is looking for a new member. Mayor David Corns said, on Wednesday at the city council meeting. Notice was given that Aaron Herman has resigned his position on the board, and the vacant position will be advertised.

After attending the Economic Development board meeting, council member Donna Foley stated the Ryan Addition housing project is on schedule, and the downtown market study has

started its plan and there are surveys that can be filled out, with hard copies available at the library and a link is available online. Foley said the board discussed possible Community Development Block Grant projects and the possibility of selling the current downtown incubator building.

Council member Ron Briery reported the City received a list of insurance losses for hail and other damage to city buildings. Briery asked each committee leader to look at their department's buildings to see if they need to be repaired.

Foley reported that the Travel and Tourism committee discussed the upcoming U.S. Highway 36 Treasure Hunt from Sept. 20-22. The committee also reported that the head tax was down this quarter. There is also interest in adding a stagecoach to Station 15, and the committee is looking into the idea. Travel and Tourism also granted \$300 to the Vintage Car Race event.

Foley also said a ground breaking ceremony will be held for the new swimming pool project on Friday, Aug. 30 at 10 a.m., and that everyone is invited and encouraged to attend.

According to City Clerk Darla Ellis, a single fund audit will be done on the water plant project, because the City received over \$500,000 in federal funds in 2012.
