## Given out of one man's love for Norton

Anyone who has driven down State Street in Norton might have noticed something new at the library. Three life size Fredrick Remington statues have recently been donated to the Norton County Library Board by former Norton resident, Sue Sharp, in memory of her late husband Bill Sharp. She chose to give them to the library board because of the love Bill had for the community of Norton, Kansas.

What about these statues makes them so magnificent you may ask. They are Fredrick Remington statues, that's why. Fredrick Remington was a famous American painter, illustrator, sculptor and writer specializing in depictions of the Old American West. He was born in 1861 in Canton, New York and spent his life doing what he loved, art, in any form he could. He started drawing soldiers and cowboys

at a young age and then after experiencing the west for himself continued with the western theme in his artwork. He even lived in Kansas, twice, first in Peabody, Kansas then later in Kansas City, Kansas. Remington died in December of 1909, leaving behind a legacy of his love for the west and his ability to bring art to life.

The three well known statues are "The Mountain Man", "Wicked Pony" and "Bronco Buster". "Each statue weighs between 1200 and 1400 pounds. All three were cast in the traditional lost wax casting process which takes sevlabor involved. These are not the first Remington statues to adorn Norton. Terry Nelson also has a collection on a smaller scale on display at the First State Bank. The First State Bank also has a life size version of "Rattlesnake". Norton now has one of the largest, if not the largest collection, of Remington statues in Northwest Kansas.

While living in Brownsville, Texas, Bill and Sue Sharp had been told of a private sale that was taking place in Port Isabell, Texas that they might want to go to. There were to be statues and other things they might be interested in so they went, never expecting to find life size Remington statues. As they pulled up, the statues were the first thing they saw and Bill said he was going to buy them. Needless to say, they bought them. The statues were brought to their home and set in the driveway. Sue insisted that Bill decide where on the grass that they were not to be home without mentioning the boys, everyone knew where we lived due to the three statues in the front yard," Sue Sharp yard for about ten years.

After five or six years, Sue answered her front door to find her step daughter, Colette Miller standing there, "Hi, don't shoot me I'm Kevlar." Unbeknowance to Sue, Bill had decided to lend the statues to the Mid America Bank in Baldwin, Kansas and Colette and her husband Mick Miller had come to transport them. Sue stated that she was not happy about this but watched as they loaded them up and drove away. They set in Baldwin for about five years but the constant questioning of the locals in their neighborhood prodded Bill to bring them back home. # City approves improvements
