### Plan ahead for conservation planting

The Kansas Forestry Service at Kansas State University provides the Conservation Tree Planting Program with seedlings and technical assistance for conservation plantings. Conservation plantings can be for a variety of purposes, from windbreaks, riparian buffers, wildlife and educational programs. Trees can help protect livestock, reduce heat or winter winds, clean rivers, and provide many more benefits to land owners and wildlife. Conservation Tree distribution occurs in early fall and throughout the spring season, to allow the best time for planting. These plantings help preserve Kansas land and livelihood. They can be used for rural or in town areas as well.

These seedlings are 1 or 2 years old, and their sizes vary from 12 to 18 inches, depending on the species. The minimum order is 25 bare-root or container-grown seedlings. Bundles and other items must be ordered in whole units. Our bare-root seedling units are \$20



for 25 seedlings; the containergrown are \$50 for 25 seedlings, plus shipping and handling. The prices of bundles vary based on amount of seedlings.

Orders will be accepted from now until May 5<sup>th</sup>. Order early to be sure of getting the items you want. Basically 28 types of trees, shrubs, and a variety of mixed bundles are available. Some plants available are burr oak, green ash, hackberry, walnut, choke cherry, lilac, various pine and cedar trees, sumac, cotton easter, lace bark elm, black walnut seeds. There are also varieties of wildlife bundles; marking flags, weed fabric, and protective tree tubes.


