Michael Gower's report addressed the results of the state audit. The next item discussed was a recap of the football field lights. The board passed a motion, 7-0 vote, to replace two poles with new light fixtures and new boxes, not to exceed \$14,000.

Mr. Gower then reported on the shop improvements. At this time, all new equipment purchased through the Hansen Grant has arrived. The shop needs more power and new wiring to cover the exhaust system and new equipment. Mr. Gower

Mr. Gower asked the board for recommendations on four different school calendar options presented to the committee. Mr. Gower reminded the board of the Superintendent's evaluation scheduled for January. The evaluation sheets will be mailed out to all board members and will be discussed in January. The final item was appointing two members of the board to the teacher negotiation team, which will be Lynette Stockman and Ryan Grammon.
