The city of Norton has seen a lot of improvements over the last couple of years and it hasn't just been on State Street or Kansas Avenue, but work is also being done on South First Street.

Kent Oil company built the Scheetz building and gas station south of it in the 1920s. The Scheetz building was originally used to house carriages and horses for the customers of the Kent hotel. Later on, the building housed automobiles for the customers. The station was a 24/7 service center. The station closed its doors in 1971 and the Scheetz building closed nine years ago.

These are two very beautiful old

historic buildings in Norton and Mick did all the windows and Overlease Miller hated to see them continue to go down hill so in June of 2011 he purchased them from Dick and Warren Heaton with the dream of fixing them up.

To this point, the only work done on the Scheetz Building so far has been to the exterior. New awnings were purchased through Ash Enterprises out of Salina and hung on frames made by New Age Industrial. The original signs painted on the building were brought back to life by Norm of Norm's Signs. New concrete was poured in front of both buildings so that it is safer for people to walk on.

As for the station, that has been a complete makeover. Jacob Hickman repointed all the brick, JD Daffer reConstruction tore the roof off, rebuilt it and did all the metal wrapping. Miller said, 'I did the inside work, I tear stuff up and get someone to build it back up.

Miller hopes to have the station completed by the end of January so that his renter can get moved in. Vicki Bailey of Norton County Title will be located in the office part and half of the station. The rest of the station will house a 1927 sedan with a 50's theme and eventually a moving mannequin that looks as if he is working on the sedan. By spring, Miller hopes to have old gas pumps out front but they will only be used for decor, they will not be functioning gas pumps.

City to look into resident's drainage issue

mstephens@nwkansas.com Norton resident Flint Griffin attended the Norton City Council meeting on Wednesday to discuss a drainage problem at his house at 609 N. Norton. Griffin said there is a large sink hole above one of the drainage tubes, and he has noticed another sink hole is developing. He said there is also massive erosion of his backyard. The council told Griffin that the City would look at the situation, and then have Griffin meet with the Public Works Committee on Jan. 20 at 5:30 p.m. to discuss the matter further.

City Clerk Darla Ellis reported that the filing deadline for anyone wanting to file for the city council seats up for election is Tuesday, Jan. 21 at noon. Council members seats that are up for election are Harriett Gill, Ward 1, Donna Foley, Ward 2, and Ron Briery, Ward 3. The general election will be

held on April 1, 2014.

The Norton City Police Department will be getting a new patrol car in the new year. The council approved the State of Kansas contract bid of \$25,753 through the State contract holder, Shawnee Mission Ford, for a 2014 Ford Utility Police Interceptor patrol vehicle, plus equipment at a total cost not to exceed \$30,000, which is the amount budgeted for the vehicle.

Chief of Police Pat Morel reported the video cameras at Norton Public Library have been installed and are working. Morel also distributed his year-end police department statistics sheet, and said it was a quiet New Year's Eve.

Harriett Gill reported on a special airport board meeting that was held Thursday, Dec. 23. Gill said Burns and McDonald was selected to do an independent cost analysis of the proposed runway. The independent cost analysis is required by the Federal Aviation Ad-

ministration as a check and balance to ing Chapter 2, Article 2 of the City avoid cost overruns.

Jeff Urban reported that a resident informed him that there was a fresh deer head and deer hide dumped in the City's trash dumpsters. Urban suggested installing a camera to monitor the activity at the dumpsters.

-waived the formal third reading of Ordinance #1652.

-adopted Ordinance #1652, amending Chapter 12, Article 2 of the Code of the City of Norton, concerning grave openings, fees and scheduling of burials, within the City of Norton.

-suspended the three reading rule requirement for Ordinance #1653, by a 4-2 vote, with Briery and Gill voting no.

-waived the formal second and third readings of Ordinance #1653, by a 4-2 vote, with Briery and Gill voting no. -adopted Ordinance #1653, amend-

Code concerning dogs and cats running at-large within the City of Norton, by a 4-2 vote, with Briery and Gill voting no.

-adopted Resolution #1-2014, waiving the annual requirement of generally accepted accounting principles and fixed asset accounting for the calendar year ending Dec. 31, 2014.

-approved Grant Agreement #13-CR-005, between the State of Kansas Department of Commerce and the City of Norton, for the renovation of a commercial property owned by Mark C. Whitney, and located at 109 E. Main Street in Norton, by a 5-1 vote, with Jeff Urban voting no.

-approved Appropriating Ordinance #1 as a whole.

-approved the Dec. 18, 2013, council meeting minutes as written.

-no building permits were presented.

Renovation housing project underway in Norton

A special renovation project is now underway at a residential location owned by Developmental Services of Northwest Kansas in Norton. Developmental Services is renovating a home located at 1113 Eisenhower, which will replace the home currently being utilized by the organization at 602 N. Grant Street. This replacement group home will provide a living environment for six individuals with intellectual disabilities.

The newly renovated home, which will be called "Our Place," will have six bedrooms on the main floor with a partially finished basement and will sit on a single lot. The accessible floor plan includes two baths, each with a roll-in shower, a large kitchen, living room, laundry room and medicine room. 'Our Place' will be fully accessible and include Fire/Life safety requirements built in the design.

In December, Norton community members gathered at Frontier Developmental Center during a special Chamber After Hours to learn more about Our Place. Attendees had the opportunity to listen to a special presentation by Jerry Michaud, Developmental Services of Northwest Kansas President, and asked questions.

'Our Place', as with all Developmental Services group homes, will be a single family residential location and is designed to blend into the fabric of the neighborhood. The individuals that will reside at 'Our Place' will receive 24 hour visual supervision with awake overnight staff.
