## Governor proclaims January as Kansas Radon Action Month

Governor Sam Brownback and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) have proclaimed January "Kansas Radon Action Month" to help educate Kansans about the dangers of radon exposure and encourage actions to identify and address radon problems in the home. Radon is a tasteless, odorless, colorless, naturally occurring radioactive gas found in nearly all soils which comes from the breakdown of uranium. Outdoors, radon is diluted to low concentrations, but once inside

an enclosed space, radon can accumulate to significant levels.

For Kansas Radon Action Month, KDHE will offer free home test kits at over 80 locations across the state. For locations, go to www.kdheks.gov and follow the Radon Action Month link.

"Make your family's health part of your New Year's resolution by testing the radon levels in your home," said Governor Brownback. "You can start by getting a free test kit from one of the participating distribution sites during the month of Janu-

About one out of every three radon measurements performed in Kansas are elevated, being above 4 pCi/l (picoCuries per liter). Some areas have higher levels than others, though elevated levels of radon have been detected in every county in the state. As many as one in 15 homes across the U.S. has elevated radon levels that often go undetected.

"Radon is the first leading cause of lung cancer in people who have never smoked and is estimated to cause over 200

lung cancer deaths in Kansas every year," said Robert Moser, M.D., KDHE Secretary and State Health Officer. "Radon is going undetected in homes across our state. All Kansans should test their homes, fix any homes with elevated radon levels and build new homes using radon-resistant methods."

Topeka, Manhattan, Lawrence and Salina building codes require new homes to be built using radon-resistant techniques, and additional cities in Kansas are considering this modification to their building

Inexpensive radon test kits are available year round at local hardware and builder's supply stores and at your Kansas county extension office. Those tests that reveal high levels can be fixed with simple venting techniques completed by a licensed professional. Homeowners should talk with a certified radon contractor if levels of 4 pCi/l or above are detected.

"Unfortunately, the reality is that radon is everywhere, and the only way to know the radon concentration anywhere,

is to test," said Bruce Snead, Director of Engineering Extension at Kansas State University. "Kansas Radon Action Month is an ideal time to take action to identify your risk by testing your home."

# Changes coming to school lunches

U.S. Senator Jerry Moran (R-Kan.) recently announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has agreed to enact permanent changes to the National School Lunch and Breakfast Program requirements in response to a request he submitted along with several of his Senate colleagues including U.S. Senator Pat Roberts (R-Kan.). In December 2012, the Department of Agriculture made temporary changes to the School Lunch Program in response to a letter sent by the senators. Senators Moran and Roberts also sponsored the Sensible School Lunch Act, legislation likely to pass this month to make the changes permanent. In response to this legislation, the Department will now make the

changes administratively. "I don't think there is any question that all of us want our children to eat nutritious foods, but the USDA rule contains impractical and unrealistic standards that leave students hungry and are cost-prohibitive for schools to comply with," Sen. Moran said. "School lunch program decisions should be made in schools at the local level – not mandated by the government in Washington, D.C. This decision is good news for parents, school

budgets and food suppliers. Unfunded mandates like this one were making it even harder for schools to provide healthy meals to our kids."

The Department of Agriculture plans to publish a final rule today in the Federal Register on Certification of Compliance with Meal Requirements for the National School Lunch Program under the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010. The final rule includes a provision to make permanent the grain and meat/meat-alternate flexibility that the Department has used on account of the senators' efforts over the past year. Under the final rule, schools will be considered compliant with the new meal requirements if they meet the weekly minimums for grain and meat/meat-alternates, as well as the total calorie ranges.

The senators' effort to change the rule was prompted by parents, school board members, superintendents, and other concerned community members expressing their frustration as the new rule was rolled out. The rule became effective in March 2012 and was implemented for the 2013 school year. Prior to today's decision, the Department lifted its strict limitations on caloric intake of grains and
