## Norton Blue Jays boys team outscored by Plainville

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The No.8 seeded Norton Community High School boys basketball team needed four good quarters to have a chance of upsetting No.1 seed Plainville in the first round of the annual Mid-Continent League Tournament on Tuesday in Plainville but had only three in a 60-43 loss.

The Cardinals led by just 14-12 after one quarter but outscored Norton 13-6 in the second quarter to lead 27-18 at halftime. The host team also scored 20 points in the third period while Norton hit just 13 to extend their lead to 47-31.

Norton kept battling and was only outscored 13-12 in the final quarter but the damage had already been done.

"I thought we played hard

throughout the game and battled to the end," said Norton head coach Doug Reusink. "I also think we are making small steps at getting better, especially on the offensive end but we still lack the consistency needed to win games.

"The key for us is not to give up and continue to work so we are headed in the right direction.

"We have a real tough stretch against some very good teams ahead of us so it will be important to find some confidence for us to have any chance of winning games."

Although Norton only hit 17 of 54 field goals for 31 percent compared to Plainville's 25 of 59 for 42 percent, four different players hit 45 percent or better.

Quinton Porter was leading scorer for the Blue Jays with 12 points. He hit 1 of 2 three-point 48 percent and 25 of 59 overall

tries for 50 percent, 4 of 9 from two-point range for 44 percent and 5 of 11 overall for 45 per-

Conor Cox scored 9 points on 3 of 5 from both the field and free throw line for 60 percent Marc Miller tallied 8 points

on 2 of 3 from beyond the arc for 67 percent, 1 of 2 two-point tries for 50 percent and 3 of 5 overall for 60 percent shooting.

Breven Sondergaard also scored 8 points and also shot well in doing so. He was 4 of 8 from the field for an even 50

## Norton Lady Jays lose to Phillipsburg in Mid-Continent play

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After playing Phillipsburg close in a loss on the Lady Panthers home court to begin Mid-Continent League play in December, the Norton Community High School girls must have hoped for a win when they returned Monday night in the first round of the league tournament.

Unfortunately for the No.5 seeded Lady Jays, it wasn't to

Phillipsburg, the No.4 seed, took an early lead and extended it with 50 percent field goal shooting for a 56-26 win.

Norton was in the previous contest all the way and ended with a 46-40 loss but Monday's game was disappointing from start to finish.

The hot-shooting Lady Panthers led 18-9 after a first quarter where Norton hit just three field goals. It got worse in the second quarter where Johnnye Ruder's three-point basket accounted for Norton's only points and ended with the home team on top 36-12 after repeating their 18 point opening period.

It didn't get any better after halftime. Norton could manage only 9 more points in the third quarter where the Lady Panthers threw in 16 more points to extend their lead to 52-21.

With the continuous clock running in the fourth quarter, it went fast. Norton scored 5 points and Phillipsburg 4 in the final stanza.

'We did not come out ready to play tonight," said Norton head coach George Rossi. "Phillipsburg came out full tilt and we stood back and just let them have their way.

"We did work harder in the second half but we couldn't make any gains.

"We have been making strides in the right direction but took a big step back.

"How we handle this is the big question. We will find out Thursday.'

After the loss, Norton traveled to Stockton on Thursday to play No.8 seeded Plainville, who lost 62-35 to No.1 seeded

Hill City on Monday evening. The game began at 6 p.m.
