Slow cookers are a great way to prepare a delicious hot meal on a more flexible preparation schedule, which works well for many people, including families with young children.

Here are 10 tips to keep in mind while using slow cookers: 1)Keep perishable foods re-

frigerated until preparation 2) Make sure hands, utensils

and work surfaces are clean.

3)Thaw meat completely before adding it to the slow cooker. It's okay to cook large cuts of meat and poultry, as long as it is Home ed Tranda Watts, Extension specialist

thawed. Check the slow cooker instruction book for suggested maximum sizes of meat and poultry to cook in the cooker.

4)Preheat the cooker (be sure it is plugged in and turned on).

5)Fill the cooker 1/2 to 2/3 full. Liquid should almost cover any meat or poultry that is used. Start with hot liquids if possible.

6)If possible, turn the cooker on the highest setting for the first hour or two of cooking time and then to low if desired. Don't use the "keep warm" setting for cooking – only for keeping food

7)Keep the lid in place as much as possible while cooking to keep the heat and steam trapped in the cooker.

8)Before eating, use a food thermometer to ensure the prod-
