The Norton Community High School girls varsity basketball team hit just seven baskets and had 35 turnovers on Friday night in Ellis and the result was a 57-30 loss to the Lady Railroaders.

Norton started by scoring just 4 points in the first quarter, adding 7 in each of the next two quarters and scoring 12 in the final stanza. In comparison, Ellis scored 10 points in the first quarter to lead 10-4, 17 in the second period to lead 27-11 at intermission.

The Lady Railroaders added 18 points in the third period to extend their advantage to 45-18. Ellis also scored 12 points in the final quarter to maintain the lead.

Bailey Ambrosier added 7 points on 1 field goal and 5 of 6 from the free throw line for 83 percent.

Leading scorer for Ellis was Alexia Deutscher with 16 points; Sarah Mick added 11.

Nine different players scored for the Blue Jays.

"We did not do a good job of blocking off on the defensive end and got sloppy at times on the offensive end but we found a way to get the win," said Norton head coach Doug Reusink.

"With nine players contributing, it was definitely a team victory."

Drew Schrum led Norton in scoring with 17 points on 2 of 3 from beyond the arc for 67 percent, 2 of 4 two-point tries

for 50 percent and 4 of 7 overall ter hit two from beyond the arc for 57 percent accuracy. He also added 7 of 8 free throws for a net-smoking 88 percent.

Tanner Furbush contributed 11 points on 4 of 9 from the field for 44 percent and 3 of 4 charities for 75 percent.

From the charity stripe, Norton converted 14 of 20 for 70 percent and Ellis hit 11 of 18 for 61 percent.

Norton grabbed 8 offensive and 25 defensive rebounds for 33 total while Ellis pulled down 17 offensive and 18 defensive for 35 total.
