Mable Elizabeth "Beth" Mustoe, daughter of Ora and Mary (Scott) Page, was born April 22, 1912, in Norton, and passed away at the Andbe Home in Norton, on March 25, 2014, at the age of 101.

Beth was the last surviving member of her pioneer family that moved to Norton in the 1870s. She grew to womanhood in the Highland neighborhood and attended District 28, Blue Ridge Grade School and graduated from Norton Community High School in 1929. She taught school for many years at I.X.L. #43, Mount Pleasant #110, Blue Ridge District #28, and Dry Creek #23.

Beth and Melvin Mustoe were united in marriage on May 28, 1933, at the home of her parents. After a few years residence in Norton, they moved to the C.G. Page ranch. After 33 years of farming, they moved four miles west of Norton, where they lived for 17 years before residing again in Norton. She and Melvin were awarded the State Master Farmer/Homemaker Award in 1968, from Kansas State University. Melvin passed away July 6, 1996, and Beth later entered the Andbe Home.



Beth was a very active member of the Norton Christian Church where she was a teacher for 50-plus years, assistant Sunday school superintendent, member of the choir, women's council and division, and participated on various committees including the committee for the new parsonage in the 1960s and the Worship committee. She took great joy in playing the piano for the children in Sunday school and for the residents of the Andbe Home. Beth was also a member of numerous community groups throughout her lifetime. Two of her favorites included the Happiness Is China Painting and the Pride Committee of Norton.

Survivors include: two daughters, Rosemary O'Donnell, Rockville, Md.; Judyanne and husband, Dale Somers, Topeka; two grandchildren, Jennifer Somers and husband, Aaron Crawford, Topeka, and Michael and wife, Tammy Somers, Durham, N.C.; three great-grandchildren, Juleah, Holden, and Porter Somers, Durham; other relatives and many friends.

# Leaders need emotional fuel

A leader's future is shaped by the people closest to him or her. A leader's personal network is his emotional fuel: his models, heroes, mentors, inner circle, and accountability partners. Dr. Tim Elmore shares this statement about self-leadership entitling it our "Emotional Fuel."

Driving your car on "empty" until the tank is totally drained puts you at the risk of running out of fuel. Automobiles need fuel in order to operate. In the same way, leaders run on fuel as well. We need emotional fuel.

Because leaders spend themselves more than the average person, they need to refuel more often than most people do. Leadership is more emotionally expensive than friendship. A leader's personal network is his or her emotional fuel. Leaders need people in their lives who don't take from them, but who replenish them. If they don't have this network of people in place, they will use their followers to meet this need. This almost always leads to unhealthy situations.

Your fuel is all around you. Some people lead because they are needy. Their emotional tank is empty and they need their followers to fill them up. We all need others in our lives for social reasons. There are unhealthy leaders who use people to meet their need for flattery, prestige, or ego fulfillment. Some leader's self-image depends on whether people like him or her – just having followers can stroke our egos. Some

Some lead because they need encouragement. If you need people for this reason, you cannot lead them well. Your perspective will be skewed by your own needs rather than what is best for your organization or team. Leaders must make sure their emotional tank is full before they lead others. Never lead out of need.


Following is an example of an individual who led from an empty tank. He was intimidated by the people and board members in his organization. He had a poor self-image and wasn't secure or confident in his decisions. He had no accountability and no mentors. The result? During a four year period, that organization fell apart. It unraveled in front of everyone's eyes - not because there weren't sufficient funds or a good strategy. It was because the leader was running on an empty tank. He became consumed by his own needs instead of looking out for the needs of the organization. People began arguing over the

direction and the vision, and who was in charge. The team was divided. The leader was eventually asked by the board chairman to leave.

Your network determines your net worth. Your value to any team or organization depends on how strong and healthy you are inside. You need to run on all eight cylinders, and your strength depends on your running on a full emotional tank. Our character and our relationships are closely linked. Whenever there is a problem in our character, we pay a price in our relationship. Whenever we have a relationship problem, it affects our character.

The following list represents a set of relationships that will fill your tank and keep you healthy: Models (people who do what vou'd like to do), Heroes (people you look up to and admire), Mentors (people who coach you and invest in you), Partners (peers who travel with you and hold you accountable), Inner Circle (those who are closest to you; they're like family), Mentees (people who learn from you). You need people in each category to be a well-rounded leader with a full tank.




