School bond doesn't pass in election

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Norton School District voters have rejected the nearly \$15 million bond issue request by the U.S.D. 211 School Board. Nearly 1,100 voters showed up at the Courthouse throughout the day on Tuesday to cast their ballots. The bond failed with 466 total yes votes and 628 total no votes. In the city of Norton the votes tallied 292 yes votes and 362 no votes. In Graham and Decatur counties there were 163 yes votes

and 212 no votes, and in the city of Lenora the bond failed with 11 yes votes and 54 no votes.

The school board, according to superintendent Greg Mann, will have to go back to the drawing board to determine its next course of action.

"I'm disappointed for the kids, the staff and the community of Norton," Mann said. "I will have to talk to the board of education to see how they want to proceed. If we have a pared down version of the bond issue in the future, costs will still go up, and we need to understand why this one didn't pass. I'm disappointed but not deterred."

Norton voters also decided on three city council seats. Two incumbents, Harriett Gill and Donna Foley, were defeated in their re-election bids. Ron Briery, who represents Ward 3, was the only incumbent re-elected. He ran unopposed and received 183 votes.

Gill, representing Ward 1, received 53 votes and was defeated by Chriss

McDiffet, who received 128 votes.

Foley, representing Ward 2, received 71 votes and was defeated by Gary Lacy, who received 204 votes.

The city of Lenora elected three members to its city council. The three members ran unopposed. Incumbents Phillip Rule and Andrea Day were reelected with 37 and 60 votes, respectively. Ed Jordan was elected to fill the position vacated by Deborah Anderson.

Norton Public Library receives book grant

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The Norton Public Library is one of 12 public and school libraries that was awarded Kansas Book Festival Grants on Monday at the Statehouse.

The Library will receive an \$800 grant which will be used for family and educational DVD's for adults and children, according to library director Mary Luehrs.

"I was so excited," said Luehrs. "I applied for that grant in October and I hadn't heard anything. Then I heard on the radio yesterday (Tuesday) that we received the grant and then I received

an e-mail."

The Festival Grant comes at an opportune moment for the library. In February, the Library Board submitted a letter to the city council requesting a one mill increase for the year 2015. The Library is currently receiving seven mills and the last time the mill levy was increased was in 2010. The Board said it had to cut its submitted budget for 2014 by \$2,900, which was mostly from the book budget.

"Our book budget is pretty small," said Luehrs. "Anytime we can enhance our collection we do."

According to Luehrs, the Library has

700 DVD's, of which 300 to 400 are checked out each month. In its letter to the city council, the Board said the Library has been getting used a lot in the past year. In 2013, over 50,000 books, DVD's, videos and books on CD were checked out. The Board also pointed out the many special programs the library offers as well, and that providing all these services to the community will stretch its 2014 budget to the limit.

"It will really be nice to have that grant," said Luehrs.

Kansas First Lady Mary Brownback announced the 12 winners of the 2014 Kansas Book Festival Grants at a news conference in Topeka on Monday.

"The Kansas Book Festival works year round to promote literacy and encourage life-long love of reading," First Lady Brownback said. "These grants will help libraries to purchase new technology and a wide range of reading materials for many reading levels."

The 2014 Kansas Book Festival will be held September 13 at the Kansas State Capitol in Topeka. All age groups are invited to attend the free, day-long event. To learn more, visit kansasbookfestival.com.

Search warrant leads to two drug related arrests

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At 12:01 the morning of Friday, March 28 the Norton County Sheriff's Department, the Norton City Police Department and the Kansas Bureau of Investigation served a search warrant which led to two arrests.

Sheriff Troy Thomson said, "This was a multi-week investigation that the Norton County Sheriff's Department

along with the Norton Police Department and the Kansas Bureau of Investigation had been working on which led to the service of a search warrant on a residence located at 430 South Street in Norton. The search led to the arrest of 24 year old Samantha Sharvin of Norton and 50 year old Todd Roepke of Kearney, Nebraska."

The two were seen by the court on Saturday and then had their first ap-

pearance yesterday. Both Sharvin and Roepke are scheduled to appear again on Friday, April 11, Roepke at 1:30 p.m. and Sharvin at 3 p.m.

Both defendants have been charged with five counts. First, distributing opiates, opium, narcotics and certain stimulants. The second charge is for possession of paraphernalia with intent to manufacture, plant and or cultivate a controlled substance. The third charge

is for no drug tax stamp for a controlled substance. Fourth is for possession of a hallucinogenic and the last charge is for unlawful action to acquire proceeds from drug transactions.

Thomson said, "Both are in custody here in Norton on \$100,000 cash bond."
