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# Norton roundballers season wrap up

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Although the Norton Community High School boys basketball team had five returning lettermen for the 2013-14 season, there were very few players with varsity experience and that caused them to struggle much of the time.

Welcomed by veteran head coach Doug Reusink were lettermen Marc Miller, Drew Schrum, Tanner Furbush, Trever Lewis, all seniors and Conor Cox, a junior.

Returning as assistant coaches were David Stover and Chris Henson. Student manager was Ruby Shirley.

Norton opened the season at Goodland on Friday, Dec. 6. The Blue Jays led by quarters 16-12, 30-25 and 38-33 but the Cowboys rallied in the final stanza to win 54-49. Goodland hit 11 free throws compared to 3 for Norton in the fourth quarter where both hit four field goals. Drew Schrum was leading scorer for Norton with 20 points and Conor Cox added 9. "I was very pleased with how we played in this first game," said coach Reusink. "Offensively, some boys stepped up; we had some trouble on defense."

Norton returned to Goodland three more times in the next week to play in the annual Topside Tip-Off Tournament. On Thursday, Norton played an outstanding team from McCook and lost 56-29. Marc Miller led Norton in scoring with 7 points.

On Friday, the Blue Jays got their first victory of the young season when they dominated Wray, Colo. to win going away. Norton limited Wray to four points in each of the first two quarters to take a 15-8 halftime lead, then tallied 23 points in the third quarter. Tanner Furbush led the way in scoring as he hit 53 percent from the field in scoring 19 points.

The Blue Jays completed the weekend by outscoring Burlington, Colo. 32-27 to place fifth in the tournament. Furbush led the way in scoring again as he totaled 16 points.

Norton's first home contest of the season came on Tuesday, Dec. 17 when the Blue Jays hosted state-ranked and unbeaten Stockton in the NCHS Stull Gym. Norton played hard and all statistics were the same except for shooting. Stockton hit 38 percent from the field and Norton only 20 percent; the result was a 41-26 loss. Sophomore Quinton Porter led Norton in scoring with 9 points. Furbush was in foul trouble so saw limited action.

On Friday, Dec. 20, Norton traveled to Phillipsburg for more Mid-Continent League play. The Blue Jays played the Panthers close for three quarters before Panther free throws and Norton cold shooting allowed Phillipsburg to pull ahead for a 59-39 victory. Norton led 19-18 at halftime and Phillipsburg led 39-34 after three periods. Phillipsburg finished with 12 of 12 free throws in the fourth stanza. Porter led Norton with 15 points; Miller added 11. "We're doing some good things but having trouble learning how to win," said coach Reusink.

Norton opened the new year on Tuesday, Jan. 7 when the Blue Jays traveled to Cambridge, Neb. Norton led most of the way but free throws down the stretch allowed Cambridge to win 48-43. Cambridge hit 13 of 17 charities and Norton hit just 1 of 6 in the game. The Blue Jays led in the fourth quarter until Cambridge moved ahead with 3:20 remaining. Furbush had another good scoring night, swishing 8 of 10 from the field for a net smoking 80 percent accuracy and tallied 17 points. Norton was hurt by 24 turnovers.

On Tuesday, Jan. 14, the Mid-Continent League Tournament began and Norton was seeded No.8. The Blue Jays traveled to play No.1 seed Plainville. Norton played hard but lost 60-43. Porter led Norton with 12 points, followed by Cox, 9; Miller, 8 and Breven Sondergaard, 8. All four hit 45 percent or better. "We battled to the end," said coach Reusink. "We are making small steps at getting better."

Norton traveled to Stockton on Thursday for a consolation game with No.4 seed Stockton, who had beaten them earlier in Norton. The Blue Jays redeemed themselves and proved that they were better than the lowest seed with a 36-34 win!

It was a close game with the lead changing hands numerous times. In the end, Porter hit a three-point and a two-point basket to put Norton ahead 34-32. With 6.9 seconds left, Schrum calmly swished two free throws and two charities by Stockton in the final seconds weren't enough.

Leading free throw shooters were Schrum, 65 percent; Henson, 64 percent; Quinton Porter, 63 percent; Furbush, 54 percent; Miller, 54 percent.

Most accurate field goal shooter was Lyle with 44 percent accuracy, despite playing only three varsity games. He was followed by Landon Porter, 42 percent; Sondergaard, 40 percent; Schrum, 37 percent; Henson, 36 percent; Quinton Porter, 34 percent.

Furbush was leading rebounder for the season, averaging 7.5 per contest. He was followed by Cox with an average of 6 7 boards

On Saturday, Norton traveled to Hays to play No.6 seed Ellis in Gross Memorial Coliseum. The Blue Javs played well again and came from behind to beat

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### Norton wrestler competes in Senior Classic

Norton Community High School senior Branson Addington, the Blue Jays' only state champion on this year's state championship team, wrestled in the prestigious 2014 Kansas Wrestling Coaches Association Senior Classic last Friday evening in the Kansas Expocentre in Topeka.

Wrestling at 113 pounds, Branson was a member of the

Class 1-2-3-4A wrestlers who were supposed to compete against the best from Class 5-6A. The large schools didn't have a wrestler in his weight, so his opponent was Josiah Seaton, Bonner Springs, who was voted the Class 4A Wrestler of the Year. In what was considered an exhibition match, Branson wrestled well but lost by a 10-0 decision.

"I was proud of Branson," said Norton head wrestling coach Bill Johnson. "He went out and competed with hardly any practice time against a very good wrestler."

Branson compiled a 32-6 record this season and defeated a previously unbeaten and No.1 state ranked wrestler for the state championship.

The only other area wres-

tler in the Classic was Michael Dusin of Phillipsburg. In the 145 pound weight class, he edged Dylan Beckner, Wichita Northwest, by a 3-2 score.

The small schools won the dual 15-12 but the final score was affected by the fact that the large schools had no entries at some weights and there were a number of exhibition matches.
