New city council members sworn in

After old business was concluded, the three winners from the April 1 election were sworn-in at Wednesday's City Council meeting.

Chris McDiffett beat incumbent Harriett Gill in Ward 1. Gill had been on the council from April 2012 to April 2014, and prior to that Gill served from April 2001 to April 2004.

In Ward 2, Gary Lacy defeated long-The Norton County Sheriff's time incumbent Donna Foley. Foley served from January 2005 to April

The council presented Gill and Foley with plaques of appreciation for their service and then the oath of office was taken by McDiffett, Lacy and Briery.

The Norton County Rotary BB Gun Team has once again qualified to compete in the Daisy National BB Gun Championships the last week of July in Rogers, Ark.

After missing last year's national shoot, Norton will shoot in the national competition for the 44th year in what will be the 49th national shoot.

It was originally the international shoot and a Norton County team has won the championship eight times, more than any other team in the coun-

The Norton County Team qualified for the national last Saturday with their performance in the State 4-H Shooting Match held in Alma.

The top three teams in each of three state shoots qualify to compete in the National Shoot. This was the second state shoot for Norton. Their first was the shoot sponsored by the Kansas State Rifle Association in Holton where Norton placed seventh, just ten points out of fifth.

On Saturday, Norton placed ninth, just three points out of eighth among

Norton qualified for the National Shoot since enough teams ahead of them had already qualified.

The national shoot is the largest junior marksmanship competition in the

"I'm really pleased that we were able to qualify for nationals," said Norton head coach Jeff Elliott. "Three of our shooters shot better than in the Kansas Rifle Association shoot and our guns performed well.

"It's nice to be able to concentrate on the nationals now.

'We want our shooters to go to nationals, not only to have fun but also for the experience. Our shooters are so young that there's a chance that a similar group from Norton could go again in two years and do even better in nationals."

On Saturday, marksmen shot in two different age groups, 9-11 and 12-14, but all scores were figured into team

The championship team was from Johnson County and scored an 1850-69, with the 69 being the number of bull's eyes. Runner-up was Wyandotte with an 1825-54, followed by Phillips/ Rooks, 1805-47; Riley/Potawatomie, 1797-52; Jackson/Nemaha, 1793-51; Sedgwick, 1770-48; Jefferson, 1768-40; Wabaunsee, 1756-39; Norton, 1753-42; Morris, 1721-36; Golden Prairie, 1686-28; Reno, 1669-28.

Stacie Elliott was leading marksman for Norton with a 97-6 prone, 90-2 standing, 90-1 sitting, 93-4 kneeling, 370-13 total score. She was followed by Lily David, 92-2 prone, 85-2 standing, 93-4 sitting, 89-2 kneeling, 359-10 total score; Christien Hawks, 91-3 prone, 84-2 standing, 90-0 sitting, 90-2 kneeling, 355-7 total score; Nicholas Davis 92-4 prone, 82-1 standing, 88-2 sitting, 88-1 kneeling, 350-8 total score; Althea Paxton 82-1 prone, 86-1 standing, 80-1 sitting, 71-1 kneeling, 319-4 total score.

Stacie, Lily and Nicholas all shot better than in the KSRA shoot.

Stacie shot her best ever and was sixth best out of 185 shooters.

The 4-H shooting competition does not include a written test on gun safety. Assisting Jeff with coaching was Jer-

ry Hawks. Stacie coached one shooter.
