

The scope of work for the project was outlined in the hearing notice that was published, but according to Cox the budget that was published in the hearing notice was incorrect; the publication included a total project cost of \$333,335, with a grant request of \$250,000. The correct figures are: \$285,001 total project cost; \$213,750 grant funds applied for, and \$71,251 matching funds to be contributed by Monier.

The Council also approved the Agreement for Administration Consulting Services of Community Development Block Grant Funds with Northwest Kansas Planning and Development Commission in the amount of \$17,000. ReNew Chic Boutique is under new local ownership

ReNew Chic Boutique, located at 106 South State St., is under new ownership. Norton resident Hypatia Day took over business operations on May 1, from Robin Townsend and Stephanie Thompson of Holdrege and Loo-

Townsend and Thompson started the consignment store in November 2011, and Hypatia worked for them as a parttime employee for a year and a half. Townsend and Thompson decided they wanted to open a clothing store closer to home and offered the business to Hypatia, which was an easy sell.

"I've always loved this store," she said, and added that she's received a lot of support from the community. "I have nothing but praise for Economic Development and the Chamber of Commerce. That group of people was a world of help and enthusiasm. The banking community has been fabulous. I couldn't have done it without them and they are excited as well."

The clothing line at ReNew consists of men's, women's and juniors, anything smaller is sold next door at Little Bo-tique. Renew has over 730 consignors from Norton, WaKeeney, Smith Center, Holdrege, Neb., and Mc-Cook, Neb.

The inventory is massive, according to Hypatia, and she and her two part-

time clerks, Rovella Shearer and Teslie Nickell, along with friends, Phyllis Winslow and Tina Jacobs, are working feverishly to process all the new items coming into the store daily. This includes steam cleaning the clothes before they can be put out on the floor in an attractive fashion for shoppers.

Hypatia believes her past business experience will help her business suc-

"I've owned my own business in Tampa Bay, Fla., in the 1980's-2000. It was a business-to-business operation selling office equipment. I've been in sales all my life. I even worked at Dilliard's part-time in Tampa Bay, which helps.'

She moved to Norton in 2005, and worked for Nex-Tech from 2006-12 selling Yellow Page advertising. She said she was laid off and couldn't find work, so she went to school and earned her insurance license. She then opened her own business in the Chamber of Commerce's incubator space, but when the opportunity to buy ReNew came about she couldn't pass it up. She will continue to serve her current insurance customers, but won't expand the operation, which will make incubator space

Hypatia and Little Bo-tique owner Martina Ruiz are considering reopening the doorway that used to exist between the two stores. Both said it would create great cross-promotion clothing to a segment of the commu-

and marketing opportunities. To help her navigate her new venture, Hypatia has an advisory team that includes the previous owners, Townsend and Thompson, her daughter, Laurie Cliff, who is the business manager at Valley Hope, and her friend Megan Hawks who is in business administration and marketing.

She's clearly committed to the success of her new enterprise, but she's also committed to her community and the revitalization of downtown Norton.

"There have been a limited number of retail clothing stores in town since Halls Clothing and Lu Jon's went out of business. Now we have four shopping opportunities in our downtown community," and added "I'm not ready to retire and I want to give back to the community."
