
from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday and Tuesday at the Beckwith Mortuary, Larned.

Magnesium, the forgotten mineral

Here is a quick little thought piece that will give you something to consider as you choose your next meal. Diabetes is a very common, very serious and very costly disease. It is also a disease whose numbers are rising rapidly. Here are some examples.

Eight and one half percent of the population of Kansas are people who live with diabetes. As we age those numbers increase. For example, 15 percent of those between 55 and 64 are persons with diabetes while 19 percent of those who are 65 and older have the disease.

If you are at risk of developing diabetes, magnesium in your diet can reduce the onset of

this disease. At least half of U.S. consumers eat enough magnesium each day. The recommendation is to consume 400-420 milligrams for adult men and 310-320 mg for adult women. So what foods are good sources of magnesium?

Seeds—pumpkin, squash, sesame

Ready-to-eat cereals such as bran and shredded wheat; whole grains

Nuts and nut butters

Dark chocolate-70 percent or more cocoa content

Beans-white beans, black beans, soybeans
