### **Huelskamp files for re-election**

Thursday, Tim Huelskamp filed for re-election to Congress in the Big First District of Kansas. Huelskamp submitted the necessary paperwork with the Kansas Secretary of State in To-

"Each week I return home to my wife and four children in Kansas - because my family, my heart, my home, and my farm are in Kansas, not Washington D.C.," said Huelskamp. The Special Traffic Enforcement Program program allows officers to work overtime hours, providing extra manpower on the roads and focusing on areas such as occupant protection, enforcing impaired driving laws, and other traffic safety issues. This year's focus of the Memorial Day Special Traffic Enforcement Program campaign is, "Click It or Ticket," encouraging seatbelt/child safety seat use for occupants of all ages.

Over the 2013 Memorial Day holiday reporting period for the Patrol (KHP stats only), troopers worked three fatal crashes on Kansas' highways. Three people were killed in those crashes, all of which were alcohol-related. There were nine total impaired driving crashes. The Patrol arrested 30 people for impaired driving. Personnel also assisted 1,176 motorists who needed help on Kansas roads.

General Manager, Denny Stoeckein indicated the Kansas State Fair has received inquiries regarding tickets on sale at sites like www. hunterhayestour.com andwww. ticketnetwork.com "These sites are advertising and selling tickets they cannot guarantee" says Stoecklein. "They have been offering for sale tickets that we haven't even put on sale yet. Thus, we know they do not have the advertised tickets in their inventory."

The Kansas State Fair contacted the Kansas Attorney General's Office, which plans to communicate with these sites to cease selling tickets these brokers do not have. However, these sites can gain access, and purchase tickets as of May 10. Secondary market ticket brokers can purchase tickets and current laws allow them to sell these tickets above market value.


