Whitney Building project moving forward

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Executive Director Scott Sproul updated the Economic Development Board on several issues at its May 13 meeting, including the Community Development Block Grant for the Whitney Building.

Sproul said the environmental checks are complete as well as the asbestos check. The architect is progressing with the plans and it may go to bid in a couple of months, way ahead of schedule in terms of the grant requirements, but the building continues to deteriorate.

"It's moving along nicely, it's just paper work right now," said Sproul, and added that the city has asked for assistance in locating funding for hand-

icapped parking. Sproul said nothing is known right now but they are working through the process.

Almena held a second housing meeting on April 30, with approximately 20 people in attendance. Sproul said the community identified that it wants to add moderate to low income housing.

There are a couple of options available, perhaps intertwining the moderate to low income housing.

"The median income in the community has raised considerably over the last few years," said Sproul.

Grants are due in August and "we will have to really get after it, but everything seems to be moving forward."

Also, Norton has been chosen as one of four communities to participate in the Broadband Pilot Program

by the Kansas Department of Commerce. Sproul said the program is in the preliminary stage and that they are in the process of collecting information. It would give the business community and Economic Development a dashboard of tools to work with. Many businesses, according to Sproul, operate without a website and this would help local businesses with digital web communication.

"They (Department of Commerce) will hopefully give us a good plan to adopt. They felt like we had good broadband coverage throughout most of the county, but businesses need help with using the many digital resources," said Sproul.
