Bulls provided by New Frontier Rodeo

Some of the biggest stars in the Professional Bull Riders will be in Phillipsburg June 7 for professional bull riding, and they won't be there to make the eight second buzzer.

They'll be there to buck off cowboys before the buzzer

The bulls of New Frontier Rodeo, of Gypsum, Kan., will be in Phillipsburg with the goal of stopping short every cowboy's dream of the whistle, a score and a paycheck.

That includes some of the best bulls in the business, including some unridden ones.

Squirrel Grove, a six year old gray and white spotted bull, owned by Jim Crowther, New Frontier Rodeo, hasn't been ridden this year, and has only been ridden twice in the past two years. The 1,400 lb. bull bucked at the 2013 National Finals Rodeo, where Shane Proctor rode him for 89 and the second goround win. Squirrel Grove is the son of Gray Squirrel, a past National Finals Rodeo and Professional Bull Riders Finals bull who bucked at the Professional Bull Riders in Phillipsburg in 2012 and died last year.

Josey Wales, an eight year old bull, will also be in Phillipsburg in June. The buckskin bull has been ridden only twice this year, at PBR events in St. Louis, Mo., and Des Moines, Iowa. He weighs about 1,700 pounds.

Both Squirrel Grove and Josey Wales are quiet, and laid back bulls. But their fellow traveling partner, You're Next,

You're Next, a five year old black bull, is an "up and coming super star," says Crowther. He's been hauled down the rodeo road for a year and a half and no one has covered him yet. He doesn't have a calm personality, either. "He does not like people," Crowther said. "He's mean." When a rider is bucked off, most of Crowther's bulls will leave them alone. But not You're Next. If the rider is still in the arena, "he'll run vou over. If the cowboy is laying there, he's going to come and get you."

Crowther began raising bulls in 1978, because it "intrigued" him. He became friends with Charlie Palmer, who was one of the few men at the time who was specifically breeding and raising bucking bulls. He

bought heifers and a bull from Charlie, and began raising bulls for his own use. When the PBR began in 1994, its TV exposure made it popular and the bucking bull industry grew. Crowther has about 100 cows and hosts a two-year-old bull sale each year, offering every one of his two-year-olds for sale. He often sells half-interests in the bulls, with his partners taking them to futurities. When those bulls are five years old, he takes them on the road to rodeos and PBR

Squirrel Grove, Josey Wales, and You're Next, along with about forty of their fellow bulls, will be in Phillipsburg June 7 for the PBR. The PBR begins at 8 pm. Tickets are on sale at Heritage Insurance in Phillipsburg (785-543-2448) and are \$20 for adult reserved seating and \$18 for adult general admission seating. Have you been bitten by a bat?

People often know when they've been bitten by a bat, but most types of bats have very small teeth which may leave marks that disappear quickly.

If you are bitten by a bat -- or if infectious material (such as saliva or brain material if it is killed) from a bat gets into your eyes, nose, mouth, or a wound wash the affected area thoroughly with soap and water and get medical advice immediately. Whenever possible, the bat should be captured and sent to the K-State laboratory for rabies testing by a veterinarian.

People can't get rabies just from just seeing a bat in an attic, in a cave, at summer camp, or




Call Shylo with all your local news. 877-3361. spaxton@nwkansas.com from a distance while it is flying. In addition, people can't get rabies from having contact with bat guano (feces), blood, or urine, or from touching a bat on its fur.

If you think your pet has been bitten by a bat, contact a veterinarian or your health department for assistance immediately and have the bat tested for rabies. Remember to keep vaccinations current for cats, dogs, and other animals.


What if you're not sure? If you woke up because a bat

sleeping or if you awakened and found a bat in your room, you should try to safely capture the bat and have it tested. The same precautions should be used if you see a bat in a room with an unattended infant/child, or see a bat near a mentally impaired or intoxicated person. The small teeth of the bat can

make a bite difficult to find. Be safe and in these situations, try to safely capture the bat, have the bat tested, and seek medical advice as soon as possible.
