Spontaneous combustion!



Early Wednesday morning, the Norton Rural Fire Department and emergency medical services were called out to the farm of Chris Harting south of Norton. For the second time this season, the Harting hay bales spontaneously burst into flames due to heat and moisture. Like a well oiled machine, fire crews and the Harting crew went to work fighting the quickly spreading fire. In a very impressive display, the Hartings got into their three New Holland loader tractors and a

skid steer and quickly danced around each other in what looked like a well choreographed number as they removed bales that had yet to catch fire while the burning bales were spread out and extinguished. All of this work along with the work of the fire department watering down the hay finally put the blaze to rest. Later in the evening, they caught fire again and crews were once again sent out.

City completes storm clean up

Public Works Supervisor Dan Bainter told the City Council, at its June 18 meeting, that the process of picking up all the broken tree limbs around town from the recent storm was going well and should be completed by Friday. Roberta Ryan said she had received numerous compliments on the city's handling of the numerous downed trees.

Ron Briery asked Bainter if it would help if the City advertised in the news media that residents can put out as many trash containers as they want, as long as each container meets the 35 gallon weight requirement for refuse pickup.

More discussions will be held at the next Utility Committee meeting regarding the new air conditioner to be installed at New Age Industrial, according to Ryan. She also said that RMA Engineering met with the committee to discuss their proposal to review the City's electrical system.

Ryan reported on the Chamber of Commerce meeting as well. There will be no fireworks this year on the 4th of July, but she said they will have the Fun Run at Sebelius Reservoir and the normal activities at Elmwood Park, and a band is scheduled to play. The Chamber golf tournament was a success, netting a profit of approximately \$5,500 and the Chamber banquet had a net profit of \$744.

Jeff Urban reported on the Airport Board meeting, and said Delvis Miller will get bids, not to exceed \$1,500, for a 100-foot hose for the fueling station. The longer hose will accommodate

larger aircraft. Urban said Valley Hope may assist with the cost of the hose.

Briery asked Urban about the status of the lights that were to be installed on Dan Cropp's tower, because a grant was received for this. Jerry Jones said he had spoken to Cropp recently, and said he had not been contacted by anyone. Briery said a meter needs to be installed to monitor electric usage on the Cropp tower. Urban said the Board secretary in looking into the matter.

Briery also reported a bid of \$14,125 was received from Foreland Group for curb and gutter replacement at the swimming pool. Briery stated the City shouldn't have to pay anyone to redo the curb and gutter that was done unsatisfactorily. City Attorney Karen Griffiths said the engineer the City hired recommended that only part of

the curb and gutter be taken out and replaced, so it might not be possible to get reimbursed from anyone unless the engineer changes the recommendation. The council decided to have Jerol from Penco Engineering review the curb and gutter with Whitney Construction at the swimming pool.

The Norton Horse Council was represented by Sam Hager, Dave Donovan and Garrett Beydler at the meeting. They inquired about the City's intention to charge for electric hook-ups at Elmwood Park. The Council invited the representatives to attend the Parks Committee's Wednesday meeting. The

Upgrades and budget discussed

For the past two weeks, John Miller from the Norton County Landfill came to visit the commissioners about future upgrades and proposed budget plans.

For some time now the county has been considering purchasing a grinder to be used at the landfill and Miller reported that he had been researching and pricing them and found that Murphy was the company offering the best price on one, either old or new. They range from \$450,000 for a used one and up to \$675,000 for a new one.

Many things must be taken into consideration when buying a grinder, the cost and frequency of replacing the teeth as well as belts, wheels, engine, drive train, cost of fuel and separator screens.

"By having a grinder it would increase the life of the compactor." Miller said "And when looking at the wheels, CAT made a visit and committed to doing an exchange on wheels."

In dealing with numbers so large the budget must be looked at as well and


Miller reported that his department has cut \$10,000 out of the equipment and repair budget but registration fees have increased due to Brian Foster of BG Consultants attending more things. He also quoted expected yearly expenses for other things.

When going over basic costs for the landfill, Miller said that they will have money left at the end of the year, approximately \$70,000, and if the county wanted to they could put this towards the grinder. By grinding or shredding the material in the construction debris pit and then compacting it, the life of the pit would be extended so it would be a nice thing to have.

"I think we are in pretty good shape." said Miller. "We are currently working in sub cell number seven and that should hold until next spring, but sub cells eight and nine need dug and that is where the Kansas Department of Health and Environment comes in wanting repeat work done." Foster is working with the landfill as a go between with the Department of Health.
