K-18 baseball team wins regional championship

The Norton K-18 baseball team played tremendous ball on both Saturday and Sunday to win the championship of the K-18 Western Regional Tournament held in Hays.

After defeating WaKeeney-Quinter 12-2 on Saturday, they outscored defending state champion Victoria 11-4 on Sunday morning, then handed Ellis their first defeat of the season by a 9-3 score in late afternoon on Sun-

WaKeeney-Quinter

In the opener on Saturday, the Norton Blue Jays assured themselves of a spot in this season's K-18 State Tournament in Lucas when they broke open a 2-2 tied game to defeat WaKeeney-Quinter 12-2.

The top four teams in the tournament qualified and they were the first day's winners.

Norton was designated the home team and took a 2-0 lead in the bottom of the first inning. Jacob Green doubled and Collyn Auker blasted a home run over the fence!

After the first inning, Norton got some scattered hits but did not score again until the bottom of the fifth stanza. Meanwhile, WaKeeney tied the score at 2-all with runs in the top of the fifth.

Norton had the top of the batting order with their half of the game away with eight straight singles by Riley Sides, Josh VanLaeys, Jacob Green, Collyn Auker, Trenton Wright, Will Ellis, Jace Ruder and Hayden Wiltfong. Ross Cole walked and Sides came up for the second time in the inning. He promptly singled again as did VanLaeys. All except Wright scored and Sides and VanLaeys scored twice; however, Wright drove in the final two runs by Sides and VanLaeys to end the game with the 10-run lead rule after five in-

Norton had a total of 17 hits, nortontelegram@nwkansas.com 2 walks and 1 strike out. Seven batters had at least two hits in the game. Leading the way was Riley Sides, who was 4 for 4, followed by Josh VanLaeys, 2 for 4; Jacob Green, 2 for 4; Collyn Auker, 2 for 4; Trenton Wright, 2 for 4, Will Ellis, 2 for 3; Jace Ruder, 2 for 3.

Jace Ruder was the winning pitcher. He hurled four innings, giving up no hits, walking 4 and striking out 9 batters. He was relieved in the top of the fifth by Trenton Wright. He gave up 1 hit, walked 1 and struck out 2

"It was a really strange game because it seemed like we were knocking the cover off the ball but weren't able to score any runs. We lost three runners to base running mistakes and it kept the game relatively close," said head coach Rick Green.

"Thanks to Collyn's home run, we had a two run lead going into the fifth inning. Then, we allowed a walk, their only base hit and an error and the next thing we knew, it was tied at 2-all. I was really frustrated and I challenged our boys to break the game open. I have always told them that the longer you let an opponent hang around, the momentum and pressure switches dugouts. Our boys responded better than I could have dreamed. We scored 10 runs with only two fifth inning and they put the outs in the bottom of the fifth to end the game. That inning will be one of my favorite all-time innings for the rest of my life. I was beyond proud of them!"

Victoria

Norton got a great start in the win over Victoria, scoring seven runs in the bottom of the first inning. Sides walked, Green singled, Auker singled, Ellis walked, Ruder got on base on a fielder's choice, Wiltfong walked and Johnson walked. "We knew coming in that Victoria would be a well coached and fundamentally sound team since they are the returning state champions," said coach Green.

"We jumped on them for seven runs in the first inning and never really felt threatened.

"They did have some scoring opportunities but Josh VanLaeys did a great job of getting the big out when we needed it.

"Collyn Auker hitting his second home run in as many games was big for us because our lead went from four runs to seven runs.'

Norton was designated the home team as they had been in the first two games. The Blue Jays took an early 2-0 lead in the bottom of the first inning. Sides led off with a single, VanLaeys walked and Wright singled and both Sides and VanLaeys scored.

Ellis was able to score one run in the top of the second to make it 2-1. In the top of the third stanza, Ellis took a 3-2 advantage with two runs scored.

The Railroaders did not score again and Norton took the lead for good with two runs in the bottom of the fifth inning. Auker and Wright both took advantage of errors to get on base and Will Ellis singled and both scored to make it 4-3.
