# Norton K-18 to play for State Tourney title

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The Regional champion Norton K-18 baseball team opened State Tournament action on Saturday in Lucas with a hardfought 7-5 win over Smith Center, the fourth place team from the Eastern Regional.

On Sunday night, the Blue Jays edged Washington County 11-10 in the semi-finals to earn a chance to win the state championship versus Concordia this evening (Tuesday). Concordia defeated Ellis 5-2 in the other semi-final game on Sunday.

Norton had runners on base early in the win over Smith Center but couldn't get across home plate. Meanwhile, Smith Center scored two runs in the bottom of the second inning to lead 2-0.

"We didn't play a perfect game but found a way to outscore them. We had some errors and allowed too many free bases but we also made some outstanding plays at very crucial times in the game. We got two huge outs at home plate which, if they scored, we would have been headed to extra innings.

"Overall, I would say it was our best offensive game but scoring seven runs on only six hits and four free bases is pretty efficient.


