A stuffed owl owned by Principal Gerald Travis became a lucky charm for the team so the season was named "The Year of the Owl".

The wrestling team also won state championships twice more, in 1961-'62 and 1964-'65, prior to the separation of schools into classes based on enrollment.

The Blue Jays, under Coach Durham, also won state championships in 1967-'68, 1969-'70 and 1972-'73.

His grapplers also placed second at state four times and third three times. His teams put together eight undefeated seasons. They won nine regional championships and eight district championships. They were champions of the Northwest Kansas League six times and champions of the Mid-Continent League five times. They also won 29 tournament champi-

Durham coached 29 wrestlers, who won 40 state championships. He also coached 25 wrestlers, who won 35 second-place medals at

He was an outstanding wrestler in both high school and college. While competing at



Granite City Community High School in Illinois, he was a three-year varsity lettermen and co-captain of the wrestling team. He graduated from high school in 1946 and attended Arkansas State University in Jonesboro from 1947-'51. At Arkansas State, he was a four-year varsity letterman and was team captain all four years. He was a four time Ozark AAU champion, Arkansas AAU champion, Midwestern AAU champion and Junior National AAU champion.

Before coming to Norton, he served in the Army and was a platoon leader in the 27th U.S. Infantry Regiment, 25th Infantry Division in Korea.

"Jake is being inducted into the most prestigious wrestling hall of fame in the United States," said Norton wrestling coach Bill Johnson. "People in Norton don't realize the influence Jake has had on wrestling across the United

"He wrote an article for the Amateur Wrestling News suggesting that weight classes be added for heavier wrestlers."

At that time, there were no

weight classes between 175 and heavyweight.

"He had the foresight to realize that it would be good for the sport of wrestling to give larger boys the chance to participate in high school wrestling," said Coach Johnson.

Not until 1996 was the 215pound class implemented. Ironically, Norton's Jeff Boyle won the state championship at that weight

"Jake has also assisted with wrestling camps around the nation, including Iowa State, Nebraska and Kansas State," Coach Johnson said.

Harold Nichols was the coach at Iowa State. He was also Jake's coach at Arkansas State.

Jake also submitted a manu-

script to the state High School Ac-

tivities Association suggesting a change in eligibility rules. At the time, wrestlers who turned 19 before the first of the year were not eligible to compete the second semester.

The activities association changed the rule and, that year, Quentin Horning was allowed to complete his senior season and won his third state championship.

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
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
