## Liquidation plan approved

The grain was only being stored in the bin until Mr. Manz either marketed it or put it into storage with the elevator. Neither Brady Grain nor Mr. Manz intended for the wheat to be considered a part of the grain inventory.  
 Mr. Criss said they had divided the rest of the grain, based on sampling and grading, into similar lots in order to get the highest bids out of the grain.  
 Mr. Criss said bidding would end Nov. 12 and that anyone who wished to could buy as many lots as they wanted if the bid was accepted.  
 He said they are going to be sending out letters to the depositors asking them to submit their claims.  
 "We're asking that anybody who has grain at Brady Grain submit their documents with their claims on them," he said.

"Then we'll compare them to the ones we have and hope that they all match up."  
 "As for people who don't have paperwork, but do have grain at the elevators, they shouldn't panic. After we review the paperwork claims, we are going to see how much grain is left and try to match it with the depositors without paperwork."  
 He said the deadline for turning in claims is Dec. 5. Claim forms, aside from being mailed, will be available at each Brady Grain site and will be available on the internet at the website: <http://www.kscourts.org/17thtemp.htm>.  
 Mr. Criss was appointed as receiver for Brady Grain in September.  
 He said his main purpose was to protect the interest of the grain depositors.
