County, employees meet to discuss health insurance

The Norton County Commissioners met with county employees to go over health insurance changes and costs before the courthouse opened for business on Monday morning.

A representative of Blue Cross and Blue Shield had met with the commissioners on Friday to go over the changes in the county policy.

In 1999 the county was paying \$340,700 in insurance premiums. By 2002 the cost had risen to \$493,000 and

this year the cost will be \$566,600. Next year the cost of premiums paid by the county is expected to be \$642,200.

As employees entered the room they were handed a sheet with the amount the county pays for single and family health insurance and the total annual premium costs over the last five years and what the cost is expected to be in 2004.

In 1999 the county paid \$258.06 per month for a single and \$572.87 per month for a family.

In 2004 the county will be paying \$488.10 for a single and \$1,079 for a fam-

The county picks up the entire cost of insurance premiums for its employees.
