





## Blue Jay players make all-state team

and Charlie Foley have been named to the Class 3A All-State Football Team by the Kansas High School Football Coaches Associa-

Quarterback Roeder led Norton's 11-1 Blue Jays in total offense this season. He rushed for 960 yards, passed for 1,365 yards, returned kickoffs for 160 yards and had 26 yards on two punt returns for 2,511 yards of offense.

Although he was named to the All-State team on offense, the 6'1", 175 pound Roeder was also a starting linebacker on defense the past three seasons. He was namedAll-Mid-Continent League first team as a quarterback and linebacker the past two seasons.

Thiele, who is 6'2", 170 pounds, was a three-year letterman and two year starter at center and defensive end. He was named All-State on defense where he made 72 tackles, second best on the Norton team.

Foley is 5'8", 162 pounds. He was named All-State as a kicker. He is a three year letterman and first team All-Mid-Continent League selection as a kicker. This season, he was successful on 54 of 56 extra point kicks for a 96.4 percent average. One of his missed kicks was blocked. He also kicked 6 of 8 field goals for a 75 percent cine Lodge; Jason Mann, 6'2", average. One of his field goals was from 44 yards out and set an NCHS record for distance.

Foley is the all-time leading kicker in NCHS history. He had 53 consecutive extra point kicks this season before missing which ranks him second all-time in Kansas in all classes. In three years of kicking for the Blue Jays, Foley has been successful on 142 extra point kicks, which ranks him No.

Foley also kicks off for the Blue Seniors Dan Roeder, C.J. Thiele Jays. This season he averaged 49 yards on 74 kickoffs.
