Almena City Council hears of disaster planning

Norton County Emergency Management Coordinator Alvin Mapes was at the Almena City Council meeting on Dec. 1 to talk about a mandate from the state to prepare for disasters of all kinds.

Mr. Mapes talked about the Norton County Mitigation 20/20 Task Force, which has been established to develop and maintain a comprehensive plan to lessen the effects of a disaster in the county. The county commissioners have hired Addie Homburg, Ellis, to help organize the plan-

He said Norton County and the cities of Norton, Almena, Clayton, Edmond and Lenora are all involved in the program.

"If we don't do this and we have a disaster, there may be no federal funds available to help us," said Mr. Mapes. We could be on our own."

The Almena City Council assigned City Clerk Twila Ingram and Councilwoman Kristi Eggers to represent the city

on the task force. Mr. Mapes said that because Almena doesn't have a designated disaster shelter, there might be federal funds available to build one.

Commissioners view trends on alcohol, drug, tobacco use

Norton County Commissioners learned that students in the county are using less and have less favorable attitudes towards drugs, alcohol and to-

bacco over the last several years. Janae Talbott, Hays, from the Smoky Hill Foundation for Chemical Dependency of the Regional Prevention Center of Northwest Kansas visited the commissioners at their meeting on Monday.

She handed out sheets with graphs and information on student attitude and

use of illegal substances. While there are some ups and downs

the trends show students have less favorable attitudes and are using less illegal substances than previously, she

Her group is more interested in trends, she told the commissioners, than in individual ups or downs. And overall, Norton students have indicated that they are using less and are looking less favorably on those who do use alcohol, tobacco or drugs.

Some highlights of the Smoky Hill research are:

• The percentage of students who

claimed they have smoked a cigarette
