## Lady Indians finish season

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The Lady Indians varsity basketball squad consisted of five seniors, one junior and six sophomores this year.

The high school games are over for Jami Pevler, Joni Pevler, Andrea Holzwarth, Sidnee Crabtree and Elizabeth Gienger.

The senior members had gained a number of hours on the floor before this year which gave them a level of experience as their final season began.

Kaycee Williams was the only junior on this year's team while sophomores included Mikaela

Grace, Christina Hilt, Jodie Hilt, Shayla Hilt, Aly Marin and Sarah Trembly.

Larry Flemming, last year's assistant coach, took over the head coaching duties this year. Susan Dinkel, who had coached basketball in the past and returned to coaching this year, was named assistant.

The first win this year came against Golden Plains in the opening game in January, which was a good way to begin the new year. Saintry also defeated Hayes Center in January. This was in a tight overtime contest. The last two games of the regular season also went in the win column as

Saintry met and outscored Cheylin and Quinter. The season ended with a 4-15 record.

The opening substate game took place the first Tuesday in March. Saintry was matched with Ellis, the number-one seed, and suffered a loss. Ellis went on to qualify for the 2A state tournament.

Saintry was involved in the Sagebrush Tournament in Brewster early in the season and played each team in the Northwest Kansas League, Colby, Decatur Community, Hoxie, Oakley, Goodland, Rawlins County and Quinter, during the year. They also met squads from Dundy County, Golden Plains, Idalia, Hayes Center, Weskan, Wallace County and Cheylin.

### Team stats

As a team, Saintry had a 22 percent field-goal average which included 977 shots from two-point range and 224 shots from three-point range. They made 267 two pointers and 43 three pointers. At the line they were successful 162 of 318 attempts for a 51 percent average.

Saintry had 481 rebounds, 258 steals and 89 assists.

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Five wrestlers competed in at least one wrestling match at the junior varsity level this year including Nathan Lamb, David Leibbrandt, Brandon McGinnis, Ross Nicklos and Logan Whitmore.

Leibbrandt had the most wins with six, also the only win by decision, and the most falls, five.

Nicklos had the most takedowns, 15; the only major decision, the most two-point near falls, two; the most reversals, 10; and the most escapes 13.

McGinnis had the only technical fall and the most three-point near falls, four.

As a team they had 17 wins and 49 losses. Other stats (St. Francis list first followed by their opponents): takedowns 36/78; three-point near falls 9/16; two-point near falls 7/18; reversals 21/21; escapes 30/22.
