Relay set for next weekend

In just a week, Sawhill Park, downtown St. Francis, will be overflowing with people, fun, entertainment and food. But, the most important activity will be the Cheyenne County Cancer Relay for Life where money will be raised to help find a cure for cancer.

People will be setting up tents and staking out an area for their lawn chairs and blankets early in the afternoon. The activities officially began at 7 p.m. on Friday, June 5, and end the next morning at 7 a.m.

One of the highlights of the evening will be the lighting of the luminarias. Luminarias are purchased in honor of a person who has lost their battle to cancer or for a person who has survived. The candles, when lit at dusk, are a memorable sight. The names on the luminarias are read and loved ones are remembered and others rejoice that they are survivors.

Luminarias are purchased from Keely Loyd, 332-2438, or any Relay Committee member. They can also be purchased that evening up until 5:30 p.m. All money raised will go to research to cure cancer and to help those who suffer from the dreaded disease.

Throughout the evening, there will be people walking around the block, never letting the relay stop. "Relay teams walk from dusk until dawn, representing the idea

that, at the darkest moment of a cancer victim, the dawn will rise," said Gloria Bracelin, Relay chairman. "One day, we will have a cure or prevention for cancer."

Teams are still needed and welcomed. Those who don't have a team can join one. Just call Mrs. Bracelin at 332-2757 or just show up.

"Please search your heart and come be a part of the dedicated groups at the relay," she said.
