**Lunch served**

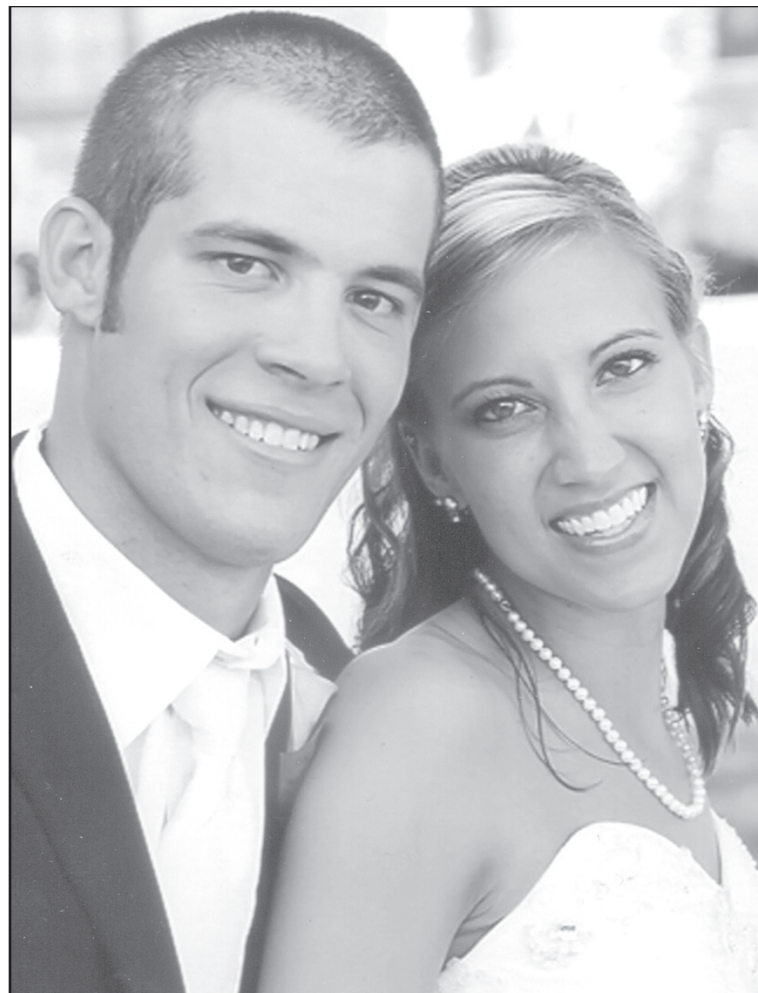
The St. Francis high school cheerleaders will be serving a soup lunch including chili and cheesy potato soup and cinnamon rolls. Money

# Conservation receives lots of applications

Natural Resources Conservation Service Chief Dave White has announced that the conservation service has received 21,300 applications to participate in the new Conservation Stewardship Program. These applications cover an estimated 33 million acres, nationwide.

Joan Gienger, District Conservationist, Cheyenne County, reports that locally there has been five applicants.

"The conservation service has received enough applications to carry out conservation activities on more than twice the number of acres Congress authorized for the Conservation Stewardship Program this year," Mr. White said. "This incredible response shows that conservation-minded producers and landowners want to at-

tain higher levels of conservation stewardship."

Kansas received 778 applications, according to Eric B. Banks, Kansas the services state conservationist, Salina.

"Kansas received 541,404 acres in agricultural land and 6,418 acres in nonindustrial private forestland for its share of the annual acreage enrollment," said Mr. Banks. Congress capped the annual acreage enrollment nationally at 12,769,000 for each fiscal year.

Lands accepted into Conservation Stewardship Program include private agricultural land (cropland, pastureland, and rangeland) and nonindustrial private forestland—a new land use for the program—and agricultural land under the jurisdiction of an Indian tribe. Operators, with control of

the land, are eligible to apply for the program's assistance.

The program provides financial and technical assistance to eligible agricultural and forestry producers to conserve and enhance soil, water, air, and related natural resources on their land; and encourages producers to voluntarily implement more conservation practices and improve, maintain, and manage existing ones.

"Those who are not approved for funding through this first ranking period will have the option to participate in the second ranking period," said Mr. Banks, "which will be held from Oct. 1, through January."
