Jan. 28, 1920 - Sept. 26, 2006 Otto Andrew Lillich, son of Justina (Brauer) Lillich and William Otto Lillich was born Jan. 28, 1920, at the farm 7 miles southwest of Bird City, Kan. He grew up there and attended country school.

Otto was the youngest of eight children. His siblings were Edwin, Herman, Alma, Martin, Eulalia, Bertha and Adelina. Otto attended high school in Bird City and returned to the farm.

He loved playing baseball and for many years was a catcher for the Bird City baseball team. He was an ardent golfer and was good at it. Otto bowled for years on the Security State Bank's team. He and Eulalia loved to play pinochle.

Otto was inducted into the U.S. Army on March 1, 1942. He traveled by bus to Fort Leavenworth for induction. For basic training he went to Oregon by train where he was assigned to the 144th Infantry. A highlight for Otto was stopping by North Platte, Neb., and getting to participate in the canteen there that met every train during the war.

After Otto's basic training was completed, he was assigned to the San Francisco, Calif., area and helped build a camp south of the Golden Gate Bridge. It was here that Otto was first assigned to extensive guard duty. They guarded ammunition depots and supplies that were earmarked for the troops and bases in the Pacific Zone of operations during World War II. He was transferred to posts in Louisiana and Florida before leaving from Maryland for Europe.

Otto served in the European Theater of World War II with additional duty in Italy as part of the 10th Mountain Division. He guarded ammunition depots in the Po Valley of northern Italy close to the German Apennines. Otto felt this was extremely interesting duty. When Otto was in Italy he served with the Pioneer 729. Here he served with an anti-tank company in the infantry and with a combat engineer battalion. He had experience in setting booby traps, land mines and other demolition charges. He helped build tank traps, bridges, culverts, etc. He served in the Mediterranean Operations and participated in the Apennine Moun-



tain and Po Valley campaigns of

Otto received the World War II Victory Ribbon, EAME Ribbon with two Bronze Service Stars, Good Conduct Ribbon HCM and Efficiency with Honor Fidelity. He was discharged as a Private First Class on Nov. 4, 1945, at Fort Carson, Colo.

Otto was a loyal and active member of the Bird City American Legion post since his retirement from the service. When he first came back from the war he worked at Johnson's Garage in Bird City for a year before returning to the Lillich family farm where he lived with his sister Eulalia for more that 50 years. He was a farmer and also worked as a lineman for Northwest Kansas Electric Association for three years and for many years he did construction work for Carmichael Construc-

Otto was a member of St. John Lutheran Church. He held different positions on the church council and sang in the church choir for many

He was a member of the Tri-State Antique Engine Association and volunteered his services there for many years.

Otto marched with the color guard of the American Legion in many parades and took part in the Memorial Day Services at the cemetery until walking became a problem for him.

A favorite pastime for him was reading. Otto would check out 10-15 books from the library at a time. Even when his macular degeneration worsened, Otto would use his head magnifier and continued reading. Pinochle was his passion at the Senior Center. He liked nothing better than to spend an afternoon there playing with friends.

Otto and Eulalia left the family farm in 1996 and purchased a home in Bird City. They lived there until October 2003. At this time Eulalia became a resident of the Good Samaritan Village and Otto rented an apartment in St. Francis so he could be close to both Adelina and Eulalia. He lived in the apartment until this November when he required full time medical care and was admitted to the Good Samaritan Village in Goodland. He died Dec. 26, 2006, at the Goodland Hospital from pneumonia

He was preceded in death by his parents, brothers, Edwin, Herman and Martin; sisters, Alma, Eulalia and Bertha. He is survived by one sister, Adelina Walter of St. Francis, nephews and nieces, nu-

merous cousins, and many friends Memorial services are scheduled 2 p.m. Feb. 10, at St. John Lutheran

placed in the Bird City Cemetery. Memorials are designated for the church and the Bird City Library.
