## Indians place fourth of 13 varsity squads

Jordan Gienger and Russell Rogers won championships at the Panther Invitational wrestling tournament in Phillipsburg on Saturday. St. Francis, as a team, placed fourth with 105 points. In a field of 13 teams, Norton won the championship with 197 points while Phillipsburg followed with 151.5 points and Beloit placed third with 144.

Gienger won the 152-pound championship with a 6-5 decision over Livesey of Lincoln and Rogers placed first at 171 pounds by wining an 8-5 decision over Hickel of

"Anytime you place first you have wrestled pretty good," said Coach Mike Frewen.

"Jordan met all quality kids. He had a tough match against Contreras of Minneapolis in the semis and won 6-5 over Livesay, the finals. The kid that placed fourth in this weight came in second in state last year.

"Russell has been wrestling good the last month and a half. He is very consistent. He is wrestling at a high level, not making many mistakes."

Other Indians placing were threethird place finishers, Darris Keller at 103 pounds, Gavin Smull at 130 pounds and Justin Sherlock at 160 pounds. Josh Carpenter placed 24; Hoxie 16. fourth at 119 pounds.

Coach Frewen had the following comments: "The kid Darris Keiswetter, Norton; 119: Augustwrestled from Stockton (Galloway)

is number one in the state. He is the best I have seen this year. Darris wrestled pretty good; Gavin was in a tough weight. His kid from Lincoln (Knapp) placed last year at State. Gavin wrestled some of the top three in the state and did a good job; Justin had to beat the Hoxie kid twice which is hard to do when you are fairly close. He is wrestling better now, at the right time of year; Josh is starting to wrestle better, especially against the better caliber kids. It was a good tournament for him. He is wrestling with more confidence, three of the top six in the state were there.

"All of the other kids were within one match of placing (wrestling for third or fourth). Many of them need more confidence as their doubt shows and holds them back. They need to believe in themselves.

"The junior varsity wrestlers had who is a good kid from Lincoln, in a good day. They will be in a tournament in Colby this weekend."


The Indians will travel to Atwood on Friday to meet the Rawlins County Buffaloes. This is the last dual of the season for St. Francis.


