Five Students receive Hansen Scholarships

Aubrey Kehlbeck and Lucius White of Cheylin High School and Russell Rogers, BJ Killingsworth and Adam Peter of St. Francis Community High School and have received Dane G. Hansen Foundation Scholarships as they prepare to further their education next fall.

Kehlbeck has received one of 35 Hansen Scholar awards. These awards are for \$3,000 for one year and may be renewed for one additional year, provided the student maintains a satisfactory academic record.

Rogers has received one of 70 non-renewable Hansen Student awards. These awards are for \$2.000.

Killingsworth, Peter and White are three of 91 students interested in vocational training who have received a one-year award of \$1,500.

The Hansen Foundation also awarded 10 Hansen Leader of Tomorrow scholarships, for \$5,000 renewable for three additional years, provided the student maintains a satisfactory academic record, and nine Community College scholarships available to Kansas Community College graduates of the current school year who plan to continue their education at a four-year Kansas college of university (see Student News). 


