CELEBRATING 95 YEARS!

Brownie Troop #76 started out strong this year and has grown stronger! In September

registration night started out with 11 members registering or re-registering. Very shortly 4 more joined and in December we welcomed two new members. That makes 17 first, second and third graders. We normally meet on the first Saturday of each month from 10 a.m. till noon, and again on the second Tuesday evening from 5:15 until 6:30 p.m.

One of the first ceremonies held was Rededication and Investiture. For that, the Brownies have to learn the Girl Scout Promise and Law and we discuss ways that they can implement those items into their daily life.

One of the first events attended this year was the Museum Trek part I in Colby. The girls and several parents attended this learning experience at the Prairie Museum of Art and History. It was a cold and dreary day, but we learned about life, agriculture and early machinery from the early days of our area. They spent part of the day in the Cooper barn, which is the largest barn in Kansas. Each girl earned a patch that day and it counted toward the three parts of the Museum Trek. The second trek had to be to a museum that was not in your own town, so we visited the Rawlins County Museum in Atwood in March on our way home from the swimming party that was held at the Colby Community College. Again, the weather was not real cooperative, but we had two great dads who volunteered to drive, one at the last minute! The museum in Atwood was very

impressive and had several interesting displays, including the General Store and the beauty shop. (Most of the girls decided that a perm would not be worth sitting under that alien-looking contraption!) The second and third grade Brownies will get to attend the Sternberg Museum in Hays for an overnight stay in mid-April. This is the third and final part.

We spend time at our meetings earning Try-It badges and some take more than one meeting to complete. We have earned several already this year, including Playing Around the World, Eat Right Stay Healthy, My Body, and Let's Pretend. Patches are also earned for the fun things we do, like the swimming party, pizza party, overnighters, etc

Our overnighter in December had to be postponed until January due to the weather. We chose to have chicken or beef tacos, mac & cheese and a midnight snack of homemade ice cream and brownie sundaes. During the evening we each made a pillow, exchanged gifts and watched a movie before settling in for a few hours of sleep. For breakfast we chose pancakes, scrambled eggs, sausage patties and strawberry-banana smoothes (made with the left-over ice cream). We prepared all of the food for both meals with supervision from the leaders. After breakfast we worked on and earned a Try-It.

Blossom the Bunny has been traveling from troop to troop all over Sunflower Council and she was visiting us on the day we went swimming, to the museum and out for a pizza party. We hope she had fun while in St. Francis.



Girl Scouts of Sunflower Council Celebrates 50th Girl Scout of USA Celebrates 95th

In 1948, she had a postage owners.. stamp in her honor.

She had a "Liberty Ship" named after her in 2007, GSUSA pre-WWII

She had a school named after her in 1954. She is a National Women's Hall of Fame inductee.

One of two federal buildings in US history is named after her.

In 1992 she was named a "Georgia Women of Achievement" awardee.

She was featured in the Deaf World in Wax traveling exhibit as a famous deaf American.

She was recently immortalized in a commemorative, bronze and granite medallion as part of a new national monument in Washington, D.C.

Who is this amazing person??

She's the founder of Girl Scouts of the USA, Juliette "Daisy" Gordon Low. Juliette spent years searching for something useful to do with her life. She met Sir Robert Baden-Powell, founder of the Boy Scouts and Girl Guides, and become interested in the youth movement.

On March 12, 1912, Juliette Low made a historic telephone call to a friend saying "I've got something for the girls of Savannah, and all of America, and all the world, and we're going to start it tonight!" Her first troop, named American Girl Guides, had 18 members. The name changed to Girl Scouts a year later.

Her goal was to bring girls from all backgrounds together to develop self-reliance and resourcefulness. She felt that girls needed to prepare for their future roles as professional women. The result of her determination is that more than 50 million girls have built leadership skills through Girl Scouting. Research shows that Girl Scout alumnae now represent 70 percent of women serving in Congress, 64 percent of women listed in "Who's Who in America" and 53 percent of women business
