The Good Samaritan Village Resident of the Month for March said getting his first car was the biggest change in his life.

Leonard Amsberry, Village resident, said he purchased the Chevy in 1945 right after the war. Mr. Amsberry served in the Army as a parachutist in the 408th Army Airborne, 11th Airborne Division from 1943 to 1945. He was flying high in the air, now, in his Chevy, he could do a little flying closer to the ground.

Mr. Amsberry was born on July 15, 1924, to Alf and Susie Amsberry. He grew up with three brothers, Lee, Earnest and Howard, and four sisters, Darlene, Dorothy, Vera and Irene.

He went to school at East White Eagle, Evergreen School and the St. Francis Grade School. He then became a Bird City Cardinal, graduating with the class of 1943.

While in school, he met his future bride Lohrene Cress in 1947. They had two daughters, Lynette who lives on a farm southwest of St. Francis, and LaNelle, who lives in Florida. The girls gave them four grandsons and there is now a great-grandson.

During those years, he owned and operated Amsberry Oil Company in Bird City for many years. Lohrene

died in 1993.

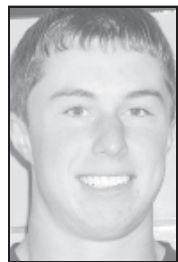
Through family members, he met his second wife Julia and married her in 1997.
