Basketball honors told; four Indians announced

By Betty Jean Winston Northwest Kansas League basketball coaches have released the names of those players receiving league honors.

St. Francis Indians Joel McAtee, Levi Weeden, AJ McAtee and Ted Crabtree were among those honored

J. McAtee and Weeden, both seniors, were named to the first team. J. McAtee finished his high

school career moving into the seventh position on the high school's all-time scoring list with 864 points and eighth on the school's all-time rebounding list with 492. He averaged 13.5 points per game this year and had a total of 296 points for the season.

Weeden finished his high school career moving into the 22nd position on the high school's all-time scoring list with 565 points and 29th on the school's all-time rebounding list with 317. He had a total of 222 points for the season.

AJ McAtee, a senior, and Crabtree, a junior, received honorable mention.

AJ McAtee scored 224 points, had 41 steals and free-throw shooting percentage of 75.4.

Crabtree scored 212 points, had 119 rebounds and a field-goal shooting percentage of 51.7.







Six qualify for State tourney


The USA Wrestling, Kansas Kids State Wrestling Folkstyle Championship Tournament, takes place on Saturday and Sunday.

Six Cheyenne County wrestlers qualified to participate in Topeka after placing in the top four at the District IV Championship held in Cimarron on Saturday. Only those wrestlers who placed at the Sub-District tournament at Colby were eligible to wrestle at Cimarron.

"We took 14 wrestlers to Cimarron and qualified six for State," said Shawna Blanka, St. Francis Wrestling Club. "They all wrestled hard throughout the day. We did have two other wrestlers, Scott Ford and Jesse Pacheco, who qualified but were unable to partici-

Gienger, who wrestled at 152 pounds for St. Francis, placed first at the 3-2-1A State Tournament in Hays, finishing his season with a 35-1 record.

In the synopsis of Gienger by Sean Purcell of the Journal staff, it said he was continuing the family tradition of his father, Kelly Gienger, and both of his grandfathers, Warren Gienger and Elton Keller, who all won State championships.

Gienger said that being a state championship his senior year was the highlight of his wrestling career and that his father is his role model because "he has helped me along in everything I have done growing up." He also mentioned that being on the honor roll all four years is an accomplishment he is proud of.

Indian coach Mike Frewen said that Gienger is an exceptional athlete, and excels in all sports but what makes him special is his work ethic



Indians receiving honorable mention were Gavin Smull (130 pounds) and Russell Rogers (171 pounds).




