Time for Irrigation Maintenance

With this beautiful weather that we have been having, everyone is getting planters ready to roll. There is another piece of equipment that also needs to be checked over...your irrigation system. A pre-season checkup is an important part of regular irrigation equipment maintenance to prevent untimely breakdowns, irregular water application and increased energy use. Bill Kranz, Extension irrigation

specialist at the University of Nebraska, said growers should look at their records to identify and replace worn parts prior to the irrigation

Monthly records of outlet, flow rate and energy use are a good way of evaluating pump and motor performance. Remember to record this information when the pivot is in the same place in the field, to reduce differences because of differences in slope.

Prior to the first irrigation, systems will have a number of areas to

grease or parts that may need to be replaced.

The following list can be used as a

• Change engine oil and filter. • Replace air and fuel filters. Grease drive shafts on pump and

motor. Check spark plugs on gas,

• Drain, flush, and refill cooling system.

propane or natural gas motors.

- Refill drip oil reservoir and allow about one gallon of oil to drain into drip line.
- Ensure gear drive is free moving and clean and lubricate non-reverse
- Run motor at 1,000 rpm for 45 package computer print-out.
