### School board reviews renovations

The St. Francis Board of Education continued to look at and plan improvements to the school when they met on Thursday.

Rob Schiltz, assistant superintendent, had bids on converting the old home ec room into a modern, hightech computer lab. There was only one bid for the work and that was a joint bid from carpenters Justin Gardner and Travis Milne, both of St. Francis, and it was noted that the electrical work will be done by an electrician.

Following discussion, the board agreed to accept the bid of \$14,095 providing that an acceptable electrical bid can be obtained. The board will also rebid the electrical component on the project and the administration will have the authority to accept a bid in order to have the project approved by May 1.

The new gymnasium project was once again on the agenda. Carl Warner, superintendent, and Mr. Schiltz had met with the architect and a potential construction management firm to further discuss the project. They are exploring constructing the gym for \$1.5 million. The original "dream" gym would have cost \$3 million but it has been downsized to fit into a \$1.5 million project.

The new gym would still have a place for concessions, a walking area for residents and a large area that could be used as a community room.

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
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
