County bridges put on plan

karenk@nwkansas.com County bridges to be replaced and the damage to another bridge were talked about when the Cheyenne County Commissioners met on Monday. Four bridges will be put on the five-year plan but the damaged bridge will be replaced this summer.

Dave Flemming, road and bridge supervisor, said that 10 days ago, the stringers on a bridge northwest of St. Francis on Road W, were broken when a gas drilling truck attempted to cross it. The bridge is an 18-foot span. Mr. Flemming had talked to Tom Roelfs, gas company representative, who said the company would be willing to pay for part of the costs. Mr. Flemming said that there is a lot of oil and gas activity in the area and a better bridge will be put in place.

The new bridge will be 18-feet wide and 24-feet long.

The commissioners agreed to raise the price for taking the big farm tractor tires at the landfill from \$10 to \$15 each. It is also costing more to have the concrete pieces crushed so the price for concrete will go up.
