

Hangar roof bids reported at meeting

Dave Yost and Ron Loudon, Airport Authority Board members, had bids for re-roofing the large hangar at the airport south of St. Francis. The roof will be repaired by Eagle Urethane for \$13,737. Insurance will pay for the majority with the Authority picking up only \$5,000.

Mr. Yost said the Authority is trying to keep the buildings in good repair and it had been at least 15 years since anything had been done to the roof of this building. Now part of the roofing is starting to blow off.

They had four company bids but some of the products used were different. Weathercraft of McCook had a bid of \$8,962 which included covering the roof with tar paper and then a sealant. Roofmasters Roofing of Colby would apply granular cover over tar and had a bid of \$11,856.

Eagle Urethane, Kip Rethke, St. Francis, offered to apply foam spray for \$13,737. Late bids of \$14,273 and \$15,649 were submitted by Carmichael Roofing, Bird City.

The board agreed to go with

Eagle Urethane because they thought it was the best seal, survives hail and stops leaks. They went on to say that the roofing job needs to be done right and needs to be maintained.

The Authority board has the money to cover the cost in its budget but it will leave the budget short when the runway project gets started.

Mr. Yost said the new apron area where visiting planes park at the airport had not turned out as well as expected. He said there were cracks in the asphalt but the Authority's consultant and the contractor, who did the work, said the asphalt plants were so far away that the materials didn't hold the heat.

They recommended using a slurry seal to coat the apron. The slurry is a heavier seal than a fog seal.

While the Authority members were not happy with the end results, they felt that the slurry seal would be better on the asphalt than to spend hundreds of dollars in court. They noted that the Federal Aviation Administration had not given the final inspection.

Crop damage needs to be reported to Agency

Farmers should notify the Farm Service Agency of any destruction of crops that may have been affected by the low temperatures and the crop can not be re-planted.

A Form FSA-576 must be completed to maintain history for crops that will be destroyed for other than the primary intended use.

Producers who have already reported planted crops such as wheat, and intend to destroy the crop, need to report to the agency the number

of acres that will be destroyed prior to May 31 and file the correct form. Appraisals will not be made by the agency and the only benefit will be a protection of history credit.

Producer's who have crop insurance and have already notified their crop insurance agent of any loss will still need to contact the agency to ensure planting history is protected.

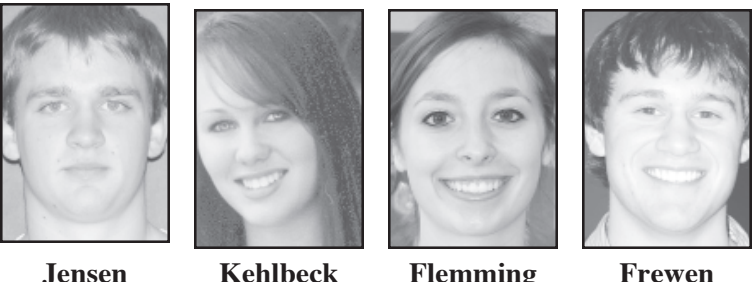
