Stephenson Memorial Scholarships.

There will be one Gillispie Scholarship at \$1,000 and seven \$500 Stephenson Scholarships as well as one \$300.

The names are confidential until commencement. The board went into closed session to approve those receiving the scholarships.

The board also accepted a scholarship from the family of Bud Burnham, former teacher. See related article.

Gymnasium

Once again, the building of a new gymnasium was discussed. The architect, Glen Strait had drawn up the plans for the gym, however it would not be the gym the board had previously looked at. And, to top it off, it would probably cost more.

The gym floor had been cut from a collegiate-sized gym, 94-feet long, to one the same size as the current gym, 84-feet long. The architect had still included the commons room which could be used for public meetings, rest rooms, concessions and seating for 1,100 to 1,200 people, as well as a three-lane walking area.

Mr. Werner said Mr. Strait had estimated the going rate for building a gym is \$90 per square foot. At that rate, the cost would be \$2.2 million. The board felt like they could swing the cost of a gym at \$1.5 million but questioned if they could save enough to build a \$2.2 million gym and, by the time they could save up the needed money, the cost to build it would have increased more than they could save.

The board talked about areas they could cut but they would have to ments. See related article.

have the cuts add up to around \$700,000. They also discussed how they could raise enough money to build the gym.

What the board was faced with was to: 1) wait until there are enough funds; 2) bring the matter of issuing bonds to a public vote; or 3) do with-

out the gym. The matter was tabled. **Improvements**

Plans for improving the school buildings and grounds were discussed. Plans include:

- Resurfacing the high school track. Work will start after May 24 and will cost \$61,250.
- Remodeling a room at the high school for a computer room. The remodeling will cost \$14,085 plus \$617 for electrical work. There will be additional cost for computers, furniture and other equipment.
- New wall mats on the high school gym walls was tabled for the
- New windows for the high school (the grade school has new windows).
- Refurbishing the brick work on the outside of both buildings.

In other business

- Mr. Werner reminded the board that Clay Keller's position on the Recreation Commission expires at the end of June. The board will need to appoint someone to this position at the July meeting.
- Locking down the schools next year was briefly discussed. There will be more information at future meetings.
- Mr. Schiltz, testing coordinator for the Kansas Assessments, reported on the preliminary results on this year's assess-
