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\$240,000 for the 6-foot concrete slab with asphalt on the sides, but Superintendent J.R. Landenberger noted that Kansas Department of Transportation would be doing a road project in the area in mid-July and the plant would be located near St. Francis. This would lower the asphalt cost considerably.

Attorney Mike Day said that there were four ways which the project could be funded: 1) The city would pay for the whole project; or 2) a petition signed by 100 percent of the property owners agreeing to pay a percentage of the costs. Either one of these options would allow the city to go ahead taking advantage of the cost savings.

The other two options would detail a resolution or petition which entail printing in the newspaper and public hearings which would be

subject to protest. These options would take more time to complete, then the plant would not be in the area any more.

If the property owners opted to go with the petition signed by 100 percent of the owners, part of the expense would be assessed to the property owners. Spencer Street was a similar situation where the water was not flowing freely. In 1984, a 12-foot concrete slab was placed in the center with 28 percent of the cost being assessed to the property owners and the city paying 72 percent.

Attorney Day noted that Kansas Statutes allows three ways which costs can be assessed to property owners: 1) through linear foot; 2) through square foot; 3) property value. The property owner then has the option of paying the cost up front or having the cost applied to their property tax (with interest) over a

period of time not to exceed 20 years.

The Spencer Street work was assessed by linear foot and cost each property owner \$262 per 50-foot lot. Spencer cost an average of \$11,000 per city block. The figures the council were taking into consideration for Parkway Drive would be assessing 26 percent of the cost to property owners or \$780 per 50-foot lot. Parkway Drive will cost approximately \$114,000 for two city blocks.

The apparent consensus of the property owners present was for the city to take care of the entire cost. Several people said they had paid to have the street put in the first time and it should be the responsibility of the city or the property owners from Yost Ford-Mercury to the Good Samaritan Village, along with the Parkway property owners, be liable

for part of the cost as the water is coming off of their business' property. The group also stressed that there were several property owners on Parkway who would have a financial burden if they were charged for the street.

Attorney Day said that the work needing done on Parkway was not normal maintenance, repair and upkeep. It is more redesigning the street to address the drainage problem. There will also be an improvement that will benefit the property owners and will increase the property value of the homes. He said that assessing part of the expenses to the property owners when redesigning a street is not just done in St. Francis, but a common procedure across the state of Kansas.

Dave Yost, property owner, felt the problem partially was a maintenance problem. He said that the property owners had paid for the oil on the street, gutters and curbs plus paying city taxes for the maintenance. He said he felt that the funds should have been managed so that the street was taken care of.

Ruben Schultz, property owner, noted that when the street was originally put in, the residents had paid for it. At that time, the council had refused to put the street in knowing that it was a waterway. He questioned, where the city had put 12 foot of concrete down the center of Spencer Street and the city was only planning on 6 feet of concrete down Parkway Drive why the property owners should have to pay almost the same percentage as those property owners on Spencer.

Clerk Mary Lampe noted that two property owners on Spencer had been to the city office and told her that the consensus of the property owners on Spencer was, if the city paid the full expense for Parkway, they would want their money back.

The city tabled the matter until more information could be gathered. It will be back on the agenda at the next meeting on Tuesday, May 22.

## Loans available for storage building

Low cost loans for storage facilities are available for producers to build or remodel farm storage facilities for commodities.

The seven-year Farm Storage Facility Loans are available for the purchase and installation of eligible storage facilities, permanently affixed drying or handling equipment, or remodeling existing facilities. Eligible facilities include new conventional-type cribs or bins and new and re-manufactured oxygen-limit-

ing and other upright silo-type structures.

All Farm Storage Facility Loans are secured by a promissory note and security agreement. The maximum amount that may be borrowed is 85 percent of the net cost of the storage or handling equipment, up to \$100,000 for each borrower. A minimum down payment is also required. For details, contact the U.S. Department of Agriculture county office staff.

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county treasurers requiring Kansas residence to renewal driver's licenses in central locations maintained by employees of the State of Kansas. Eileen King, Riley County Treasurer and president of the Kansas County Treasurers Association, presented Congressman Moran with over 81,000 petitions from Kansas residents opposing the removal of this service from county offices. This was a staggering number of signatures that Moran said surpassed any petitions delivered to him dealing with federal legislation.

Cheyenne County Treasurer, Dolores Jenik collected signatures from 37 percent of the residents in the county. Ms. King also presented 70 county resolutions supporting the maintaining of driver's license services in local courthouses.

U.S. Homeland Security Secretary, Michael Chertoff assured Kansas residents that the federal rules would not force Kansas to change its system.

Consequently, Kansans will not lose access to services at their county courthouses, Congressman Moran said.

Carmen Aldritt, Director of Vehicles of the State Department of Revenue, said Kansas lawmakers have passed legislation clearly authorizing county treasurers to act as agents of the state in providing driver's license services.

Currently more than 70 Kansas counties offer driver's license services, while only 37 counties have state-served sites and five counties offer both. Only two Kansas counties have no service. "The county sites are important in

offering convenient access for renewing driver's license," Mrs. Jenik said. "The Act is to ensure better homeland security and who better to enforce this than an office that knows most of its constituency."

Mark Schemm, Smith County Treasurer echoed the sentiments of those who signed the petitions and fellow treasurers, stating it was important to keep homeland security at home.
