 The aquacise class must have 10

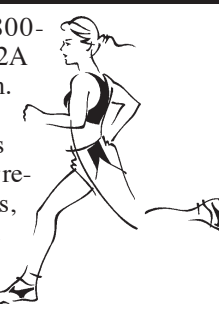
