He attended schools and earned a degree in agriculture. While growing up, Max worked for many dairy farmers and at other odd jobs. He served in the Swiss Army.

In 1949, Max came to Yuma County and lived in Yuma, Colo., with his aunt, Mary Wenger and her husband, William, for a year. After that he worked for a number of farmers around the area and also started his own swine production.

In 1952, he met Irene Sanderson, and in 1953 they were married and moved to the Carl Peterson farm northwest of Wray where they lived for a year. In 1954, they purchased a home in Wray

By this time Max had a goodized swine group and had also started doing custom baling. He started out with an old Case baler, and soon upgraded with new bal-

In the wintertime he picked corn and helped put up all kinds of feed. Max also had started a small herd of dairy heifers, and started a cage-laying business. He skinned rabbits and sold the hides to Lester Shaw, In 1956, Max and Irene purchased a small acreage west of Wray, where they kept their dairy herd. He set out many evergreen trees and moved a barn

on the location.

In 1982, Max received his citionly missed one question and was top in the group. Max, Irene and their youngest daughter, Chrisse went back to Switzerland to visit Max's family. This was the only vacation the couple had, and the only time Max had been back there.

Max was a hard worker and always took pride in what he did. He retired from baling due to illness and arthritis and devoted full time to being a licensed cattle dealer and went to a sale/auction everyday of the week. He loved to buy the one that needed lots of care and usually saved them. Max was also a 4-H leader.

Max will be remembered by many for his beautiful Christmas display he put up every Christmas. Max was a very kind and loving husband, father, as well as a wonderful grandpa and greatgrandpa. Above all, he loved his wife, children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Max was preceded in death by his parents, a brother, two sisters, father-and mother-in-law, three sisters-in-law and their husbands, and two special grandsons.
