# High water bills on the agenda of the city council

High water bills were discussed when the St. Francis City Council met on June 19. Two residents have complained of high water bills, one through the winter and the other in

Ron Ewing, one of the residents, was present to explain his case. He said that a new meter had been put on May 15 and when he had read the meter on June 15, it had showed a usage of 7,000 gallons. Last year for the same period the usage was 93,000 gallons.

Superintendent Landenberger explained that it cost between \$25 and \$35 to send a meter in to be checked. The code book stipulates that the resident must request the meter sent in and the cost to the resident (if the meter is OK) is \$10.

Miller and Associates officials said that usually when a meter is not working properly, it reads slower. They also noted that when the **sheet** value has been messed with and only opened halfway, this will make the meter run faster.

After some discussion, the council decided that both meters would need to be sent in to be check until a decision could be made. Mr. Ewing approved his being sent in and Superintendent Landenberger will contact the other resident for her

**Superintendent's report** 

Superintendent Landenberger said that he had been approached concerning putting a 150- to 190foot tall self-supported tower for a telecom company. It was unknown where the company planned on putting the tower and the council asked that Superintendent Landenberger request more information.

He also noted that he had been approached about putting in a sand volleyball court at the courthouse park. The council were concerned with the sand being pushed onto the grass. The matter was table.

**Property cleanup** 

Attorney Mike Day distributed copies of Resolution 2007-2 and Resolution 2007-3. The resolutions are in regards to property being an environmental hazard on the exterior of the yard. The properties needing cleaned are 509 W. Webster and 513 W. Webster.

He said that a courtesy letter had initially been sent to both owners. Next a letter from the city superinowners had 15 days to clean up the property or 10 days to disagree. If the owners disagreed with the determination of the superintendent, they can request a hearing before the council. Neither letter has brought a response from either property owner.

The resolutions authorize the city attorney, city superintendent and other city agents to proceed with abatement of the property if no response is seen.

The council approved the resolutions and the city police will serve

#### **Attorney report**

Attorney Day said Ordinance 541 which was published in last week's Saint Francis Herald would need to be voted on again by the council members and this time signed by the mayor. He said that Kansas Statues and city's ordinances states that only the mayor can approve an ordinance. Mayor Scott Schultz was not present at the last city council meeting.

The ordinance was once again unanimously voted for by the council members with Mayor Schultz signing the ordinance and is republished in this issue of *The* Herald. The ordinance reduced the weight of a truck parking on city streets from 25,000 to 10,500. The ordinance also eliminates the four-hour parking and put in its place a permitting procedure in which those driving overweight vehicles would need to acquire a permit to park.

### Pool report

Bruce Swihart, swimming pool board member, said that, as of June 14, nine lifeguards were certified which leaves one still needing the certification. Two of the lifeguards previously obtaining their certifica-

### Police report

Chief Troy Gardner asked the council to consider sending two of the city employees planning on taking the 911 dispatchers positions in January to a two-week school in Salina. The school is put on by the Kansas Highway Patrol Academy. Chief Gardner noted that the sheriff's department will be paying for the training and asked that the council consider paying for a portion of the employees wages. The matter was tabled until Superintendent Landenberger could be present as they are employees at the city power plant.

# Other business

In other business:

- Due to wheat harvest, the countendent stating that the property cil approved to reschedule the July 3 St. Francis City Council meeting from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m.
  - Two Representatives with Miller and Associates of McCook updated the council on the waterflow study. The flow-test study estimates the deposits in the pipes and evaluates hydrant and value replacement. The test should be completed in a month and they plan to present the remainder of the study and the recommendation of improvements.
  - Fireworks licenses approved were: senior class; Sherry Hilt; Judy Brunk and Donna Stevens.
  - Attorney Day noted that the city's auditors had requested a new lease from Cheyenne County Wildlife. The previous lease had expired in 2006. He noted that he was waiting for the organization to show proof they carried \$1 million in liability insurance. The lease is a five-year term with the organization paying one dollar per month.
